PENNSYLVANIA DUTCH

Often the term "Pennsylvania Dutch" does not refer to immigrants from the Netherlands or their descendants, but refers to those who came from Germany, "Dutch" being a corruption of "Deutsch," meaning "German." Many of these people settled in southern Pennsylvania and further south in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley.

FIGURING BIRTHDATES FROM TOMBSTONES

Tombstone:

Died 15 June 1871, age 77 yrs. 10 mos. 3 da.

How do we determine the correct date of birth? First, make the sequence read days-months-year:

Death date is: 15 06 1871 Age is: 03 10 77

To subtract 10 months from 6 months, you must borrow 12 months from the year, changing the year to 1870. So you now have;

Death date: 15 18 1870 Age: - 03 10 77 12 08 1793

So the birthdate would be 12 August 1793.

The same concept works for "borrowing" days too as shown in the following example, except you borrow 30 days if the previous month has 30 days or 31 days if the previous month has 31 days, etc:

Death date is 3 June 1871, age is 77 yrs. 10 mos. 15 days.

Death: 03 06 1871 or 33 05 1871 or 33 17 1870 Age: 15 10 77 15 10 77 18 07 1793

Birthdate is Thursday, 18 July 1793.

Now how did I know the birthday was Thursday? I used the perpetual calendar on the next page.

CALENDARS

<u>Julian Calendar</u>: This was the first modern calendar put into use in 45 B.C. by Julius Caesar. He decreed that there should be 3 years of 365 days each and then one year of 366 days. this was the beginning of what we call Leap Year, when we add a day to February every fourth year.

<u>Gregorian Calendar</u>: The final calendar correction was done in 1582 by Pope Gregory the 13th. This is the calendar we use today. Ten days were dropped from the Julian Calendar so that on Oct. 15, followed Oct. 4, 1582.

Roman Catholic nations were first to adopt this new calendar in 1582. Most Protestant countries did not adopt it until almost 200 years later. the British Empire and the American Colonies made the switch in 1752. September 2, 1752 was followed by September 14, 1752

Are Genealogy Collections in Danger?

The following is an excerpt from a note which appeared on Prodigy on 07 Oct 1992 from A. Allen.

Last week I sat in the Gwinnet County (GA) library in Lawrenceville while the genealogy collection was pulled from the shelves around me with no comment. I asked what was happening and was told that the collection was being deleted. I asked what would happen to the books. They said some would be destroyed "if they didn't look good", some put in general circulation and some sold.

I asked what was the criteria for destruction to get a clearer answer. The lady picked up a book with a small amount of spots—those done probably by the acid in the paper reacting with fingerprints, etc. She thumbed through it and showed it to me as an example. If you have ancestors who came through Gwinnett County you will no longer be able to see the collection. I had a book from 1895 in my hands and wondered what will happen to it. By the standards of this woman from Maryland now running the library system in Gwinnett, that book might "not look good". Lindsey Cook (another Prodigy member) found that the 5 volume set of "Roster of the Confederate Soldiers of GA: 1861-1865" is to be destroyed...It is my understanding that the Director of the Lake Lanier Regional Library System feels that libraries are places to "read" not do "research".

She is using a Mission Statement dated July 1, 1987 which states "An extensive genealogy collection is costly in terms of space, staffing and capital expenses. In a service area populated mainly by residents originally from other regions and states, establishing and maintaining such a collection seems an inappropriate use of tax revenue." Also included in the Mission Statement is "the Library will meet the needs of residents for information in their pursuit of...personal interests and "support individuals pursuing learning on their own, including...hobbies, cultural

interests and self-improvement" and "It will support research inquiries,"

A half inch thick computerized book list of the genealogical collection at the Gwinnett Library dated June of 1992 has been reduced to a matter of four pages as of 17 Oct 1992. There is no inventory of the current repository for even one of the missing books.

This kind of happening is not confined to Georgia. In the nearly 500 notes that followed the original note on the national computer bulletin board, comments were made that it had already happened in Montgomery County, Maryland and Oregon. Other notes which were sent to me privately indicated that it is happening in at least two other areas. Unfortunately, librarians who are willing to speak of the problem fear for their jobs. No library names were given and I was asked not to quote anyone.

The changes in the Georgia library happened overnight. No one knew of the plans except library staff. Books were sold for cents on the dollar and others have since been discarded. Of the over 500 books that were supposed to have gone to the Court House only 137 have been received. No one seems to know what happened to the other 363. The Director claims that the collection was offered to the local historical society. However this does not appear to be the case. A transcript of a letter from the historical society to the director was also included on the Prodigy string of notes denying any previous contact with Pinder.

In early November, a Gwinnet County Library board meeting was held. It was stated that a large group of books had been sent to the courthouse. The books were put on shelves, then taken down and sent back to the library. Some books were dumped in the process. It was agreed that Lindsey Cook be allowed to review the books prior to a December book sale where unwanted books would be sold. The December Gwinnet County Library Board meeting was postponed till Janu-

ary, making December access to the board impossible.

By the time you read this, the situation in this library may be over, but what is happening in your local library? A. Allen placed the following suggestions on Prodigy. They are well worth thinking about:

- 1. Be active in the chapter of Friends of the Library associated with your branch.
- 2. Find out how decisions are made in the library and make an effort to monitor the actions of the oversight board (the Board of Trustees in this arena).
- 3. Get to know the reference librarian and employees.
- 4. When you see something that looks like a survey at the library, take it and be genealogy specific.
- 5. When you stop at the state line to "get directions" & walk the dog, sign the guest register and indicate your reason for visiting as "genealogy research".
- 6. Support the various Historical & Genealogical Societies in your area of research.
- 7. Keep your eyes open in used book stores for signs of collections being dispersed.
- 8. Find out the chain of accountability, i.e., to whom does the Director report, to whom do the Board report.
- 9. Find out how to file a complaint against the actions of library system and its' employees.
- 10. Find out the state law regarding antique books in your area—contact your state archives for the state code reference or hope your library has a copy of the code. Find out what constitutes a violation of that law.
- 11. Ask for help on the genealogy bulletin boards.

Look At the Neighbors

By Lou Pero

Many, if not most, genealogists have lines on which they have run into a blank wall. This is especially true when the name of the family is a common one, or when moving backward in time to the place the family came from. Suddenly, there's just no place else to look.

In my own family, I gave up on two lines. The first was the Pierce family. Thomas William Pierce was in the 1860 Pettis Co, Missouri census with bride Elizabeth Neoma Simmons. I was given

a letter written about 1871 by Thomas' sister Alma Grove Allen, from Belmont, Allegany Co, New York. From this I was able to trace Thomas back to his grandfather, Daniel Pierce, who came into the Six Corners area in Allegany County before 1810. A land record showed that Mathew Stillman of Hopkinton, Rhode Island, held a mortgage on Daniel's land in New York. The records for Hopkinton, Rhode Island, were the first I ever looked at, using the facilities of one of the earliest LDS Branch libraries. That was nearly thirty years ago, and although others have tried, there it stands. Meanwhile, back in Missouri, I found clues that suggest that Elizabeth Sinmons' father, Russell, and her grandfather, Paul White, had New York and Rhode Island connections. But none of these names is unique, so how could I get anywhere on it?

The other seemingly hopeless line in my family is the King line—my maiden name is King, yet it was the first line I deemed impossible. There is at least one King in practically every census in every county—it is really almost as bad as Smith and Jones. I knew that my grandfather,

Merideth (Mariday) King, was born in 1867 in Franklin Co Alabama, and was the son of James M. and Margaret Hulsey King. My major research for the past seven years has been the Hulsey family. The earliest I knew of them was Greenville Co, SC in 1784, then Franklin County, Georgia about 1800. By 1820 they had spread out to Missouri, Arkansas, Alabama, Tennessee and Kentucky. In Franklin Co, Alabama, two Hulsey sisters and a brother married two King brothers and a sister. Other sisters from the same Hulsey family married a Crittenden and a Thompson. The Thompson line seems to have a link to Greenville County, SC. There is an early Merideth King in 1820 Franklin County Ala, and in 1850 he and his wife said they were born in North Carolina. It appears that Meridith's daughter, Nancy, married Henry Gargis, the son of William Garigus, who is also in the 1820 Franklin County, Ala, census. There are other known connections to a Pierce (another Pierce) line, and to Abraham Allen. Over the years I have pieced all this together but have never found any earlier King ancestors, nor ever thought there was any chance of doing so.

Then along came Joe Greene of New Smyrna Beach, Florida. He was able to follow his line of Matlocks back into the early Virginia colony by noticing that Matlocks, Webbs, Witts, Cartwrights, Hulsey/Huddleseys, Esteses and others lived in the same area over a hundred years. They migrated from the early Virginia colonies, the Dan River area of Virginia and North Carolina, to Burke County, North Carolina, then down to Greenville County, South Carolina. Matlocks and Esteses also moved to Georgia when the Hulseys did, and show up in Franklin County, Georgia. As the Matlocks multiplied and dispersed from each other, they stayed in company with neighbors and relatives and Joe was able to find his Matlocks by looking for allied names. Some of the material he found had actually been known to Hulsey family researchers for several years, but existed as isolated pieces, proving nothing. It now

appears that the Hulseys, Matlocks, Webbs, Witts, and Esteses, at least, were in-laws as well as neighbors. Seen in the context of Matlocks and other allied families, the family history can suddenly and surprisingly be extended back to about 1634 in the Virginia Colonies.

Joe Greene has shown us an important concept in tracing a family from one place to another, over several generations of records. He looked at the neighbors as well as his own names. In so doing he has helped focus attention on a research technique that could be useful to anyone whose research has come to a dead end on a particular line, using only conventional methods of searching for specific records and specific names. Margaret M. Cowart of Huntsville, Alabama, whose work with the land records of northern Alabama has been so important to Alabama researchers, has said, "I have always thought that researching an area from 3 to 5 miles could prove a marriage and constellation migration, just to name two good examples."

Everyone who has done research has noted that people tended to marry into neighboring families. Given the transportation and communications of the day, it is not difficult to see why this was sothere would be little opportunity to meet and marry a person who lived more than ten miles away, unless it would be a relative. (Of course, there were exceptions, such as the soldier who was captivated by a pretty face as he served far from home, and the river boater from Illinois who fell in love with a Creole miss.) But, usually people married the neighbors. Now imagine what would happen if one of these people was hit with the urge to "go west." Is his wife's mother going to let him go off to Texas where she will never see her grandchildren again? No way—she boohoos until her husband sells out and hitches up the ox-team, and they all go to Texas. And, to keep peace in the family, so do all her other married children, and some of their in-laws. One of the better examples of this was the case of Joel Hulsey, who decided to move from Dade County, Georgia in 1842, and took with him all his married children except one daughter, as well as a number of other families related by marriage, including a number of Burnetts. They must have made a good-sized wagon train. This would certainly be constellation migration as referred to by Margaret Cowart. This seems to me to offer hope to anyone researching names like Smith and Jones and Thompson, as well as King and Pierce.

Now, how does the researcher go about using this idea? Is it necessary to do the genealogy of everyone in the county? Possibly not. (Although the more you learn the more chance you have of finding yours.)

My first step with researching on a wider level would be to analyze the family of my grandparents or great-grandparents to find out the names of the spouses of their children and other people associated with the family. Your family may still, even unknowingly, be keeping up old family contacts, and certainly may have been doing so a generation or two ago. A certain pair of cousins decided to do their genealogy together, and were surprised to find that they both needed to look at the same records for many years before their common ancestors married, and that there had been more than one marriage between branches of this family. This could be the case with those who have married into any family today.

Another way to develop your list of associated families is by studying the estate records of the area to where the ancestors lived. Witnesses to wills were usually neighbors, friends and relatives—people who could be trusted to represent one's best interests. Witnesses weren't supposed to be those who would benefit from a will, but they could be cousins and brothers-in-law. Chances are, anyone involved in an estate transaction was either a relative or very close friend.

Land records can be another source of information on associated families. In areas where metes and bounds were used to describe property, usually three or four neighbors are named. Looking up the neighbors' deeds will expand the list. In areas where a lot number is given it is usually possible to get a copy of the lot map. Where the township and range are given, scanning the microfilmed land re-

cords may yield the names of neighbors. (This is a lot of work, it's true, but to me serves as an emphasis for the idea that there really is probably something more we can all do.) In areas where plat books and original entry books have survived, ready-made lists of neighbors may exist. For instance, entry books as kept at the Huntsville, Alabama, land office starting in 1818 show the sales of land in the Franklin (later Colbert) area. The land office books had pages for each section of land, and listed the people who bought in each section. These books have been expertly researched and published by Margaret Matthews Cowart. (See illustration.) I have decided to consider anyone whose land is listed before 1840 as a possible co-traveller of Merideth King, because even Merideth didn't buy land until some years after he got there, and relatives often came out to join other family members later. Comparison of this list with the census records will help me determine who came when.

Another type of record available for some areas is the plat map, with the land sold to each person sketched in. Plat maps might also be called Survey Books. Usually only the original sale is recorded on the Plat book although I have seen at least one county where this was apparently kept more or less up to date, a new map being made when an old one became too complex. It may take some digging, but any type of land record is a possible source of information for a researcher who is trying to compile a list of neighbors.

The other main method for developing a list of neighbors involves the census. If the ancestor has been followed through a move or two, so much the better for the census method. Make a list of all the heads of household on the same page as your ancestor, or perhaps all the names in his township or whatever seems practical. This will be tedious work, but should need to be done only once. For instance, if I had made a list af all the people listed for the same district where my Kings lived in Franklin Co, Alabama, for 1850, I would have had a list of all the people my grandfather's brothers and sisters married. The married children and certain of their in-laws all went together to Baxter Co, Arkansas, and recent evidence suggests that at least some of them had come there together from Greenville County, South Carolina, before that. Comparing the 1850 Franklin County, Alabama, cen sus township with the 1880 Baxter County, Arkansas, census would have listed them all. It will be interesting to see how this works with the Pierce problem. I think I have already spotted one name which occurs in both places.

One thing that could simplify the census approach to compiling a list of relatives and friends is the fact that many censuses have been published in book form. If that were the case in an area that interested me, I would photocopy the pertinent township for the later census, then compare with the same area listing for the earlier census. This is necessary because the census taker didn't necessarily enumerate people in the order they lived on a road, but in the order in which he interviewed them. A deviation indicates new people moving in, those living at a greater distance, etc. To make a list of neighbors who might have stayed together, determine which names are on both lists, which are about the same age, which might be old enough to be the grandparents, etc. This is one time when imagination is per missible in genealogy. Be alert to possibilities—every area will be different.

In some cases it may be necessary to compare the census list with the land records to determine whether land is very close or at opposite ends of the county. It was at one time common practice for a man to give a piece of land to each married child. It can be extremely thought-provoking to discover that a certain young man has either bought from or been given land by a particular older individual, just at the approximate time he married. It is even more thought-provoking to discover that both the fathers of the younger couple came to the area about the same time and say they born in the same place.

A list of possible associated families should not be too narrow too soon. Some names should be added simply because some vague clue suggests them. For instance, anyone with a different surname who lived with the family one year—often these were relatives who had come to the area recently, and were staying with relatives or family friends until they could become established, as was the case with my Thomas Pierce who married Elizabeth

Simmons in Pettis County, Missouri, and lived with the Greenstreet family just before the Civil War. I passed right over that family the first time I read the census, but in the end I wound up researching them, too.

Once a list has been developed, the census index may be the best place to begin investigations. For instance, consider Merideth King in the 1820 census for Franklin Co, Alabama. By making a list of people who bought land in the same section and those within a few miles, I can learn which of them arrived in Franklin Co at the same time he did and stayed in the area, by comparing with subsequent census records. I can check the 1850 census to see which of them came from North Carolina, as Merideth said he did. I can check the 1810 census for North Carolina to see where people with those surnames were in 1810. There are Kings in half the counties in North Carolina in 1810. But hopefully the number of counties where there are Kings and Fouchees and Hoggs and Garguses (for instance) may give me an idea of where to start looking for Merideth's family.

One other source of information which should prove useful in analyzing for clues to further research could very well be the county or town history. Whether your relatives were written up in the history or not, the neighbors may have been. Along

with this, check for published histories of the families on your list—you don't really want to do all their genealogy, too. You just want to latch on to their coattails, so to speak, to get a free ride to more information on your own family. Subscribing to the local genealogical magazine, running and answering queries such as those in Heritage Quest Magazine, and checking the International Genealogical Index at your local LDS branch library are all ways to find out what research has been and is being done on these families on your list of associated families. Remember, most people find that on a standard four-generation pedigree chart, at least one line has been researched. This will probably be true of some of the ancestral neighbors, too.

The local history may also mention groups who came in a body for some common reason—such as groups of Quakers or certain European refugees. If even one of the people on your list was associated with one of those migrations, you may find this to be the clue you needed. I once knew a man who read in the county history that a group of Quakers had settled in the area where he knew his ancestor had lived. "Do you suppose....?" he wondered. Sure enough, he found that the ancestor had married a Quaker, and that her line had been thoroughly researched through church records, down to

and including his own grandfather's generation. Not only that, but the Quaker researcher had given two generations back from the man who married the Quaker on his line. It appeared that the man and his married brother had come from somewhere else together, along with several of the brother's wife's relatives, who also intermarried with Quaker families. The fellow decided that not only was he related to half the Quakers in that county, but also half the non-Quakers. The last I saw of him he was gleefully planning a trip to Ohio.

In the case of my Kings and Pierces, it seemed that the field was so broad I would never be able to even find a place to begin, so I didn't. I am reminded that there is one universal rule of genealogy, which I have heard many times—ancestors are where you find them. Research should continue along conventional, and usually effective, lines whenever possible. But no one can find ancestors for whom he is no longer searching. Researching associated families as demonstrated by Joe Greene with the Matlocks and Hulseys can pump new life into a dead-end search. Maybe it can help revive the search for your "hopeless" ancestor.

How does this impact your research: Prior to the 1752 change, the first day of the new year was not January 1 but March 25. So when you are researching and have a date of 7 Feb 1714, this would be 7 Feb 1715. All dates from Jan 1 through Mar 24 would be in the old year. You can write the dates as 7 Feb 1714 O.S. (old style) or 7 Feb 1715 N.S. (new style) or better as 7 Feb 1714/5. This is the way you will find it entered in most books, except on early court records, the original records.
