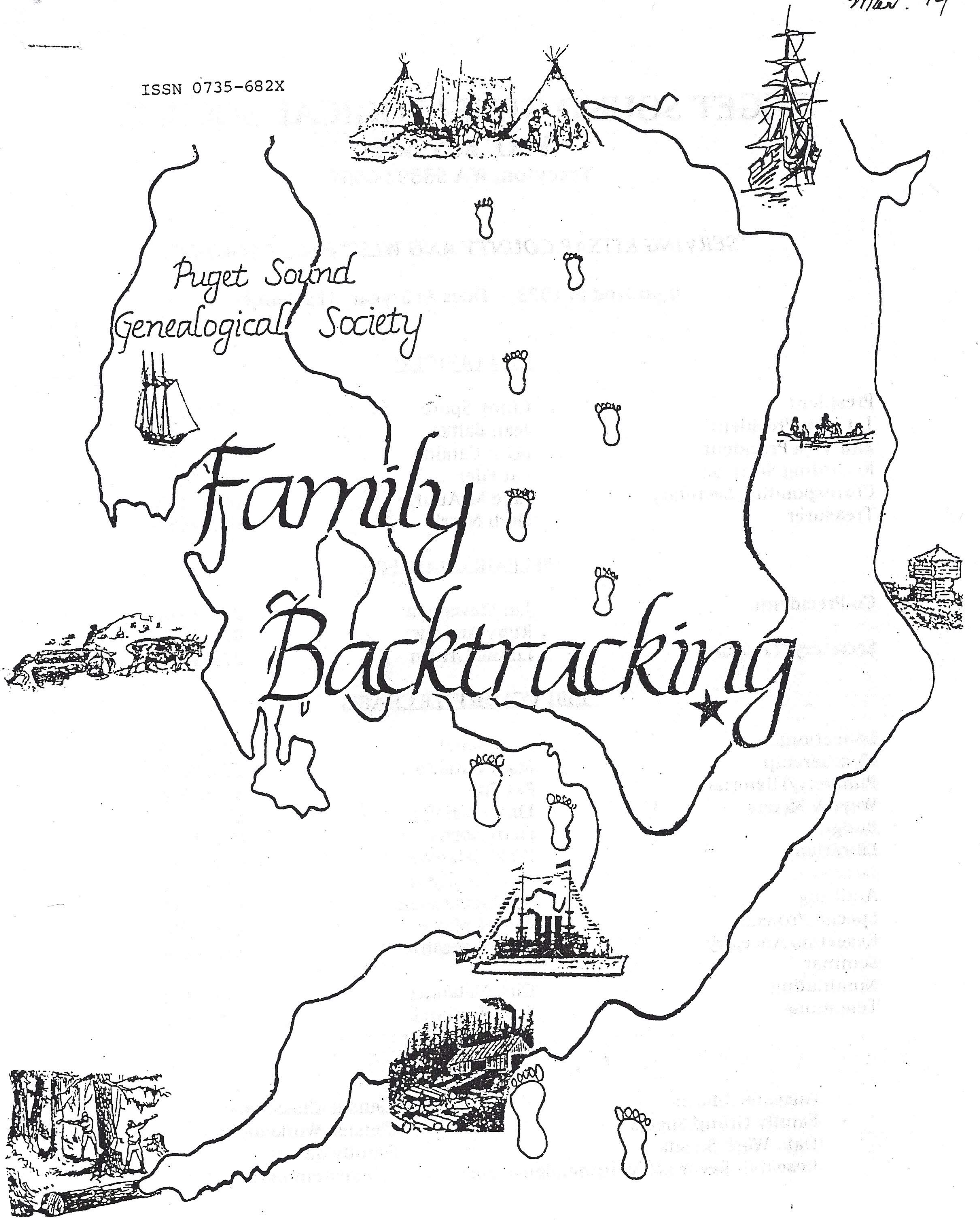

PROPOSED BYLAWS CHANGE

The following proposed change to the bylaws, "Article III MEMBERSHIP AND DUES," will be voted on at the April meeting. The purpose of this change is two-fold: (1) to eliminate the need to change the bylaws each time a change in dues is required, and (2) to allow for a reduction in dues for those people joining the Club after mid-year. For example, under this bylaw change, the "single member" dues would be set at \$12 per year, \$7 after July 1, and \$4 after Oct 1. The words to be added are shown in bold italics, and the words to be deleted are shown in underlined italics.

"There shall be four (4) classes of members, with qualifications for each as follows and dues are payable by January 1 and delinquent after February 1. Delinquent members will have all PSGS privileges cancelled. ***Annual dues shall be set by the Executive Board and approved at the next regular PSGS meeting. Annual dues can be reduced for people joining after mid year.***

1. Single Membership: Single membership shall be composed of any person who is interested in genealogy and is researching family history. *Annual dues are \$10.*

2. Family Membership: A family membership shall be composed of a husband and wife and children under 18 years of age. Those joining at the family rate shall receive only one Club bulletin. *Annual dues are \$12.*"

Recently, twenty-seven genealogists from this area made a sojourn to Salt Lake City that was enjoyed by all. Many of us have been making this trip since 1982. One may wonder why we choose the harshest part of winter to make this trip, but if you ever had to stand in the long lines during the height of the tourist season; the answer would be as clear as the Utah skies. We stay at the Howard Johnson Hotel, which is very convenient, since it has a restaurant attached and is next door to the LDS Library. At lunchtime, many of the "gang" walk to the Church's cafeteria, others go to Howard Johnson's and some choose to stay right in the library, eating in the small cafeteria room. It is fun to go with a number of people; all interest in genealogy. This gives you a chance to converse and share ideas with each other. Oftentimes, special books or records found by one person may be of interest to the group. We plan the trip so that we have a number of days for research, then a free Sunday to gather our wits and think about where we need to research further, and finally a few more days to take care of the loose ends. Since I do a quarterly newsletter for the Horton family, for me it is a time to gather as much information as possible for that newsletter, as it is my goal to publish as many records as I can find on this family.

If you are planning a trip to Salt Lake City, you should first decide on two or three specific families on which to do intensive research. Then devise a secondary list of items from your research for your other families. Normally, if I get tired of working one family,

and need to clear my head, I default to my secondary list. Sometimes, it is very easy to keep going on a family from the secondary list if something interesting pops up.

At the library, you can find Surname and North American research books (abstracts of court records, cemetery books, etc.) on the main floor and microfilm and microfiche of the same areas on the second floor. There are two basement floors, the first one being devoted to foreign research (Scandinavian, German, Italian, etc.) and the second to English research. The Library opened a computer area in the old Utah Hotel, which is on the other side of Temple Square. The fourth floor of this building has all the family group sheets (two sections - those who are members and those who are not members.) If you can find your family in these books it is easy to take your line back a few generations. The computers have the IGI and the Ancestral files as well as the Social Security Death Index and other indexes. These can be downloaded to a computer disk, if desired. one thing you should know concerning the SS Death Index is that if a person did not draw Social Security, they will not be on this file. Another important item you should be cautious of is that the "generations of data" you get from these computer files is not always accurate. You have to go back and prove the relationships yourself. There are undeniably many errors in the computer. The library is open from 7:30 am until 6:00 pm on Monday, 7:30 until 10:00 pm on Tuesday through Saturday, and closed Sunday. The Mormon Church is continuing to microfilm records in the upper Midwest and western areas of the United States. The library records are especially good if you are researching on the east coast or a European country.

If you have never been to Salt Lake City, and the opportunity presents itself, I highly recommend a visit to the library. It is quite an experience for any genealogist, one you will not soon forget!

CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS ENTER THE COMPUTER ERA

English-born Fergus Elliott came to the United States in 1857 or 1858. He joined Company G of the 109th Pennsylvania Regiment in 1862, fought in Georgia, was mustered out as a sergeant, married, became a policeman in Germantown, Pennsylvania, and died in 1923.

From his journal we know more about Elliott than about many who fought in the U. S. Civil War. Soon, thanks to regiments of modern volunteers armed with computers, visitors to National Park Service Civil War sites will have access to a database record of every soldier and sailor of the Union and Confederacy.

The information is stored at the National Archives on handwritten index cards compiled after the Civil War. Today's volunteers, many of them genealogists, are entering the data into computers, beginning with the 179,000 U. S. Colored Troops. The 5.4 million cards include numerous duplicates of the nearly three million participants. By 1996 the completed database will give the first true count. (Nat'l Geographic, Vol.185 #2, Feb 1994)

PIONEER NORRIS'S IN BROWN COUNTY, OHIO

Transcribed by Herbert S. Norris

The following article is a reformatted extraction from an unpublished document titled "The Norris Family of Maryland and Virginia" by Harry Alexander Davis. An original typescript is located in the Rare Book Section of the Library of Congress, Washington D.C. The text was compiled from letters, etc. of ELIZA JANE NORRIS, affectionately called AUNT TOCIE, who lived her entire life, (May 23, 1841 - July 16, 1926), in Brown County, Ohio. She was the Grand-daughter of Abraham Norris, who was a nephew of Aquilla Norris. Abraham and Aquilla purchased adjacent parcels of land in the South Eastern corner of Clermont County in 1808. The article is presented here because: (1), it provides insight on the lives of the NORRIS pioneer families who resided in Lewis township, Clermont County; an area that became a portion of Brown County when said county was formed, and (2), the Aquilla mentioned above, is this compilers Third Great Grandfather.

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STORY OF AUNT TOCIE

Their houses and barns were made of logs as timber was plentiful, houses being made from large trees hewn on both sides, two stories high and covered with clap-boards. Floors were made from nice hewn puncheons, large stone chimneys and large fireplaces around which many happy gatherings have been had with Johnny cake and corn pone. Kitchens were large with great fireplaces for cooking, a long iron rod fastened in the wall and iron hooks on this upon which to hang pot, kettles and large spiders, and there were large ovens in these chimneys used in baking, no cook stoves arrived in the settlement until the year 1843, and upon their coming they brought relief to our old mothers.

The school houses in which our grandfathers received their education were made of logs with large fireplaces, and one long window of panes of glass between two logs. The writing desk was a long puncheon under this window with a log split with legs to stand on, the round side of the log as bench to sit on. All the seats were made this style, no backs, and so high the small children's feet did not touch the floor, still they were happy and content.

Each family had a good loom house with a good supply of wheels, reels and winding blades. One or more of the family was taught to spin and weave all the clothing for winter and summer wear. An extra web of cotton was always, with perhaps an extra stripe of blue or copperas yellow, added for the ladies gowns, and a finer spun thread of flax for the men's shirts. An extra web of blue jeans was woven for the men's coats, pants, and vests. The stockings were knit on needles.

Our grandfathers and grandmothers wore suits and gowns purchased in Maryland. Our grandfathers in their broadcloth cutaways and long vest coats and possibly knee breeches; our grandmothers wore their large straw bonnets lined with white satin and a bunch of what was called artificials and ribbon strings. The artificials were imitations made from linen cloth and colored to suit the flower it represented. The younger ladies were content to wear sun bonnets made from calico, only a few could wear gingham for it

took one and one-half yards at sixty cents per yard to make a bonnet. Happy was the man who possessed a woolen hat as most of the hats were made from rye straw plaited and sewed to fit the wearers head.

Their bedclothes consisted of linen sheets and pillow slips woven from flax, the bed ticks made from tow linen woven with the thread of tow or coarse part of flax, first hackled, then snatched, then spun. Their bed coverings were woven blankets and cover lids of wool, carded by hand cards for that purpose. They spun and wove their table clothes and towels, and all cotton goods were made from raw cotton in like manner.

Shoes were made in the settlement by one of the number capable, the leather being bought in large quantities and brought to him. All soaps and starch were made in the settlement, sassafras being made to perfume the soap. Saleratus was made by them for making bread and cakes, this was made from Hickory wood.

The farmers used the old time wooden mole board on their plows, their grain was separated by flailing and trampling, for this purpose one barn had a puncheon floor, and the tramping was happy time for the children, (they) could obtain all horseback riding they wished, after the grain was tramped from the straw it was put through wind mills, this blew the chaff from the wheat. About six miles from the settlement on White Oak creek was a water mill, this mill ground all their corn and flower. A great quantity of hominy was used, made on the old fashioned hominy block.

Physicians were very scarce, only one they could obtain lived in Augusta, Kentucky, ten miles distant and the Ohio River to cross. The sick were nursed and medicines for them made by our grandmothers from barks and herbs. In case of toothache or gatherings a man in the neighborhood by the name of Park owned an instrument called a turnkey, which was used to extract teeth, and a slim pointed knife was used to lance boils. No chloroform was used. They had great faith in steam baths, mustard poultices and the like.

At the first settlement in Ohio there were no churches and but few preachers. Brother Maley came once a year and held a series of meetings in the settlement. The meetings were conducted in the different homes of the settlers, the minister's home being in Indiana, he always came on horseback as there was no other mode of travel in that day, he wore a heavy gray cloth overcoat with cape attached, always carried a pair of saddle bags containing his extra clothes, bible and hymn books. Great preparations were made by the Norris family for these meetings.

Their religious views were divided, those who came from Maryland and Kentucky were Baptists, afterwards some became Methodists, New Light or Christian, and some held to the Universalist belief, all were great bible readers, none were radical, all believing that each had a right to his or her views. In a few years Eden church was built in the settlement and all attended this house of worship; it was founded upon the Methodist creed, it now has two cemeteries attached, the first is filled with old settlers and their families, the church has been remodeled once or twice.

The Norris families had a strange attachment for each other several marrying cousins and second cousins, their affection for each other proved so strong that several

died of grief at the loss of a relative. So attached to their parents were they that those who lived in Iowa and Illinois made yearly visits to see them so long as they lived. They made these trips on large wagons, the time consumed in these trips was from two to three weeks yet made in ease thinking of the happy reunion soon to be had. For these meetings great preparations were made to receive them, they were entertained by every family related to them, always coming in the month of September so as to return before winter. The writer has seen as many as sixty people at one table, composed of three generations. Their visits lasted about a month and when the time came for them to separate it proved a very solemn occasion for all present.

Menu for breakfast: buckwheat cakes, maple molasses and honey. All having sugar groves and apiaries. Menu for dinner: roast pig, roast turkey, chicken pie, old fashioned pound cake, peach and apple cobbler covered with rich cream, sweet meats were not so favored. Menu for supper: mush and milk. They made their own cheese and large supplies were put away for winter use, plenty of sausages and smoked hams.

The Norris women were fine cooks, experts on corn pone, salt rising bread and biscuit, and for the men it can be said that very rarely could one be found who used profane language.

The education of our grandfathers were limited, our fathers had a better chance and obtained fairly good educations. Several of the later ones are graduates of colleges, John P. Norris, son of Basil, from Delaware College; John L. Norris, son of George, and Samuel P. Bronson, son of Rachel Norris Bronson, from Oxford College, Ohio.

A large number were physicians and almost every family possessed school teachers, there were some fine writers and composers in the family but not many lawyers or ministers, the family appeared deficient on oratory and music. It has been said that the reason for lawyers not appearing in the family was that there was a deficiency of the 'gift of gab'. Not one singer in the family so far back that none can remember. Several newspaper men came from this family, Olin W. Kennedy, grandson of Abraham Norris, and Edgar Bronson, grandson of Rachel Norris can be named. The family had a number of tradesmen, coopers, carpenters, plasterers, etc. More farmers than any other trade or profession and all good farmers. Their political views were divided, some Jacksonian Democrats, some Whigs, and almost all were opposed to slavery. When the Civil War started all stood for the Union and the old flag, many fought and died under the flag of liberty. Not many sought office, although a few filled county offices, such as treasurer, auditor, clerk, and one or two were elected and served as county judges, some filled township offices such as Justice of the Peace and trustee. Some of the later generations have represented the people in the state legislature among whom can be mentioned, Charles A. Brannock, grandson of Abraham Norris, he was elected (to) two terms from Clermont County, Ohio and was successful in securing the passage of the "Brannock Local Option" bill which proved the greatest piece of temperance legislation ever brought forward in Ohio, many states afterward taking up the same plan and evolving it into law.

The Norris family possessed the traits of charity, honesty and industry, were all mild tempered and down to the present generation still hold this trait.

The Norris Family in this section of Ohio and those the writer knows in Kentucky, made the wilderness blossom into the rose and have done their part and more in bringing this country into its present high state of cultivation and intellectual improvement and none there be who need feel ashamed of claiming relationship with this family of people.
