The FamilyFinder Index contains a collection of over 150 million names taken from US censuses (1790-1880), social security death benefits records, an assessment of state land and marriage records, and pedigrees from Everton Publishers' Computerized Family File and "Roots" Cellar that have been archived on CD-ROM by Automated Archives Inc., a Utah research firm. This CD is included in Banner Blue's Family Tree Maker Windows Deluxe CD-ROM Edition. In addition to the above index, you also get an interactive Genealogy "How-To" Guide.

Pennsylvania Genealogical Library Guide

The National Archives - Pacific Northwest Region

The National Archives - Pacific Northwest Region is open from 7:45 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday (except Federal holidays) and the first and second Tuesday evenings of each month. Effective November 1994 there will be individual daytime reservations for microfilm readers. They will be assigned on a first-come, first-served basis with no time limit until researchers are waiting, at which point researchers having had the most time will be asked to relinquish their reader and sign a standby register for access to a new reader. Exceptions may be made for long distance commuters or travelers. Reservations by individuals are limited to the first and second Tuesday evenings of each month. Organizations may reserve up to 8 readers anytime on a case by case basis, depending on workload and available resources.

The Archive is located at 6125 Sand Point Way NE, two and a half miles NE of the University of Washington and are served by METRO bus routes 74 and 75.

Their genealogical microfilm publications, such as the censuses of 1790-1920, are available to the public on a self-serve basis, assisted by volunteers. Novice genealogist classes are available September through May. RECOLLECTIONS BY ONE OF THE GROW FAMILY

As I turn back the pages of time within my book of memories, many amusing and interesting things are called to mind - amusing and interesting to me at least.

In the spring of 1881, my parents decided to go to Washington Territory and made the journey from Kansas to San Francisco by way of the Southern Pacific Railroad and then by boat to Seattle and settling on Bainbridge Island.

My brother Frank and myself made the trip across the plains with a covered wagon; the old time prairie schooner. Leaving home on the 1st of May, 1881, with many and weird experiences, we arrived in Seattle on the night of September 28th - the same year - no team, no wagon; on foot and alone. Strangers in a strange land.

I call to mind that all I had consisted of 10 cent socks in my coat pocket. We managed to get lodging in the old NEW ENGLAND hotel for the night, but that did not include breakfast. (I wonder if that could be the reason that I'm always hungry?)

Father had written us a letter addressed Boise, Idaho, while we were enroute in which he mentioned a Captain Randolph of the steamer OLD SETTLER. As events proved, it was fortunate for us that he did, as the fare from Seattle to Bainbridge Island was \$1.00 each way on the steamer SUCCESS to Port Blakely. Our chances of reaching the Island were not too good. Finally we decided to look up Mr. Randolph. We found the captain and told him where we wanted to go and why we didn't go. The captain, a tall whiskered man, listened to our story and finally said "All right boys, I'll take you up to Eagle Harbor as soon as I can steam up, and you boys can help me a day each, next week, beachcombing."

We readily agreed to this proposition, although we had no idea what beachcombing was. On the following week the captain came over to the Island and helped us per agreement.

My first trip to the west side of the Island was in the spring of 1882 (April). I went to Fletchers Bay to Pleasant Beach around the shore.

Late in the afternoon, I arrived at the small ranch, somewhere in the vicinity of Crystal. I climbed over a rail fence and went to where a lady was working in the garden. I asked the lady if there was any road or trail from there to Port Blakely or Eagle Harbor. She replied that there use to be an old road up on the hill that led towards Port Blakely. And - I don't think I can get through that way now as numerous forms of gigantic monsters of the forest lie prone to it.

In recalling the name and faces from out of the long ago; there was a George Meigs of Port Madison with his Yankee drawl and with that any true son of Erin would be proud of. Mike Thelan, also called Mike Taylor, a stocky built man. The boys used to call hi- you could have been a tall man, Mike, if you didn't have so much of you turned out for feet. While Mike was set in his ways, he had a kindly twinkle in his eyes and a heart of gold. He was a man who never refused to honor any request and was kind to animals. It seems to me that such wonderful traits should tally several points in a man's favor, when he crosses the long divide and knocks on the gates over on the other shore.

IMPRESSIONS OF MY RESEARCH TRIP TO SALT LAKE CITY

Recently, a group of PSGS members went on their annual research trip to the Family History Library (FHL) in Salt Lake City, UT. We thought it might be informative and a source of encouragement for those members who have never taken this trip to get a chance to read about the impressions of those members who have gone. We attempted to gather information for this piece by giving each researcher a questionnaire to fill out. Based on the fourteen replies here is my attempt at a summary (original comments in quotations).

Why did you come on this trip (i.e. what was your expectations)?

For background, let's look at the reasons people go to the FHL. As one might suspect, there are as many reasons to go to Salt Lake City as there are people; "to do research, have a work break, and because I like Salt Lake City and good companionship" or "to see Salt Lake City as a tourist" or "to find my people missing on my chart (particularly Hudson)." Most of the reasons fall into three categories: (1) To research from the multitude of books available only at the Library, (2) To maximize the number of films one can look at in a short time and (3) To get assistance from the library assistants and researchers. Many of the films are available through the local Family History Centers (FHC). However, the delays incurred between finding information in one film, which leads you to another film, and receiving the second film reduces the research effectiveness. This delay is eliminated when researching at the FHL. In addition, the books are unavailable at the FHC unless they have been microfilmed.

What were your impressions of the Library, its holdings and assistance of the librarians?

Until you visit the FHL, you cannot fathom the resources that are available for your use, free of charge. The number of films run in the millions, the books in the thousands, and in addition several computers tied into the available data bases (there is over 150 individual computer terminals located in the new *Joseph Smith Memorial Center*, formerly Hotel Utah). Initial reactions were "mind boggling!" and "awesome" and "very well organized; once I understood the system." In addition to the "sources," each area has "volunteers" who will assist you in locating sources, suggesting other lesser-known sources to search, and, in the case of foreign films, reading or interpreting the records. "Two of the librarians in the Scandinavian area assisted me by interpreting about 30 Swedish obituaries." In cases of difficult problems that they cannot handle, they will provide a list of researchers available in Salt Lake City who can assist you. I think the following comment summarizes it all: "As always I would like to pack up the whole library and take it to Belfair on loan for 5 or 10 years. The librarians really try to help out and are always pleasant."

What interesting or exciting things did you find?

As one might expect, when you are in a large candy store, you will always find a piece of candy you can't live without, "especially the "Candy Barrel." They have delicious sugar free chocolate caramels! Yum Yum." Likewise, at the FHL you will find one book or a film that will open up your family tree in a big way. "From one book, The Bristol Probate Abstracts, I was led to 13 wills that proved 12 ancestors!!" Others found things that they might have not wanted to know, "That I'm related to Jackie [a member of our group]." Still others traced a family line for several generations, "I traced the Kingston family from Cork Co., Ireland in 1795 to the present."

How many books and films did you research?

The reason for this question was to give the new visitor a feel for the number of sources one can research in a very short time. The library is open from 7:15 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. five days a week and from 7:15 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Monday; 84.5 hours of research per week. Of course, the number of films/books one looks at depends on the purpose of the research and the type of document (i.e., it takes much less time to review a land deed index than to read through the town records of Rehoboth, MA.) However, based on our inputs, our researchers covered up to 1400 books (about 100 per day) and up to 300 films. One person found so much information that he copied over 354 pages from the books and 576 pages from

the films (that's a whopping \$133). It doesn't take long to pay for the trip from the savings in postage and rental fees if the same films were sent to you at the local FHC.

What interesting things did you see on your trip, not connected to research?

Not all your time in Salt Lake City has to be spent researching. In fact, we normally travel over a weekend so we get a Sunday break. Many of our members use this time to sight-see, relax, or party (ha-ha). Some of the sights to visit are: Mormon Tabernacle Choir's performance on Sunday, old Hotel Utah (now Joseph Smith Memorial Center), the view from the 26th floor Administration Building, eating at the Lion House. One of members met a new friend, "Pete, the horse."

Was traveling with other PSGS members beneficial to you?

It is important, particularly if you somewhat new to genealogical research, to travel with a genealogical group. This is particularly true when you have many questions and aren't sure what to do, "because of the sharing of information such as new books or indexes at the library and this group is a fun group to go with." Other members of the group have gone through some of the same problems and can help you solve your particular problem more quickly. As one member put it, "Yes, nice to have someone to help interpret - mull things over with to help come to conclusions. Also people share "finds" of new books or new research material they have found."

What recommendations would you make to others who go on their first trip?

If there is anything to be gained by this article, it lies in this question. The success and enjoyment you have on a research trip to the FHL depends to a large degree to the amount of advance planning you do. The recommendations that cover this area are important enough to show individually:

"Hope for the best but be prepared for disappointment in case you don't find anything new."

"Bring comfortable shoes! You stand much of the day at times. Also comfortable clothes ..."

"Take back up work to do in case you do not locate your primary person(s)."

"Familiarize yourself with index fiche [Locality Index] at the FHC at home."

"Be better prepared with a small notebook of your facts arranged by families and cross referenced. Make a list and plan to stick to it. I went off on tangents."

"Start out with three main goals, [do] not try to cover too many family lines."

"Think carefully of what you will be looking for so you have enough background information to help the research. Make copies of original documents to bring along. Pack lightly. Copy machines now take crisp \$1 bills."

"Be prepared to spend most of the time on books and look at microfilms that cover many records (e.g., land deed indexes/records). When you find a film that is very hard to read, like "town records," save your time and read them at home (FHC)."

Were your expectations met?

With only one exception (No, Hudson is still missing!), everyone replied that going to Salt Lake City has resulted in meeting or exceeding their expectations in finding additional information on their ancestors and new sources.

Conclusion

A research trip to the Family History Library at Salt Lake City can be a very rewarding and enjoyable event. Most researchers will find more information in a shorter time here than anywhere else. Developing

research plans in advance, using your local Family History Center, can maximize your time at the library. Traveling with other genealogy researchers can enhance your enjoyment and reduce frustrations created by a lack of research knowledge. Taking time out for sightseeing and relaxation will help to prevent "burnout" and reduce those periods of depression resulting from hours of looking without finding any ancestors. Don't worry about your lack of experience, after a few days you too will feel like an old pro. Bring money and just DO IT!!
