PRESIDENT REMARKS

In February of this year, I was asked to participate in one of 5 focus groups held in Washington State. The groups were under the direction of the Historical Records Advisory Board. At this point I would like to quote a portion of the invitation letter; "Washington has received a federal grant to do a ten year strategic plan for our state's historical records. Our steering committee and the full board believe that this is truly a historic opportunity for us all. Paper records are disintegrating while massive quantities of records are now being digitized with the computer revolution. At this point in our planning process we need ideas and insights in this information gathering phrase. The steering committee has identified over 25 groups that have a significant "stake" in the future of historic records. A few of these are university and religious archives, state and local government archives, private museums, heritage groups, and tribal organizations." My focus group, of about 25, met in Olympia on March 5th for a half day session. We explored a wide range of questions and pooled views about a desired future for Washington's historical records. The results of the 5 groups, involving over 100 individuals, provided information for a later


strategic planning conference for Washington's Historic Records.

I was honored to be invited to participate in the Strategic Planning Conference on April 19 and 20 at Snoqualmie Summit Inn. The participants represented multiple disciplines and were a select 40 from the entire state.

The chosen theme was: Sustaining Washington's Singular Heritage into the Twenty-First Century (2006)

- Where do we want to be with our historical records (with special attention to preservation and access) 10 years from now?
- How can we better utilize and integrate our various resources held across the state?

The two full day working sessions were exhausting but fruitful. The group was very diverse and interesting. Our efforts culminated in a definite preferred plan so that we actually can get the future we desire. It was gratifying to learn that there is concern and a future for the preservation of original records that are so important to us as genealogists. The major problems of access to and inventories of all records were addressed and solutions formulated. Without adequate solutions for the two problems, genealogists will not be able to locate desired records. The electronic technologic explosion of our times demands constant and rapid change. After the conference, I feel that our state is on track and now actively dealing with our historical records problems. Incidentally, not only were genealogists adequately represented, but our concerns were voiced and solutions planned. When a final report is published, I will share it with you.

THE COMPUTER CORNER

If you are considering using the net (INTERNET) for genealogical purposes, there are several companies locally that provide unlimited access to the Internet for a monthly fee of about \$25-\$35. Most of these local companies will help you get started, give you direction on modems to use, and I'm sure that they would even be willing to teach you the basics of surfing the net. Most people use one of the standard on-line services such as Prodigy, America On Line, or Compuserve. These companies charge a monthly fee for a limited number of hours (AOL allows three hours of free use), and then charge an exorbitant amount for each hour afterwards. The other shortcoming of these major companies is that if they do have a local phone number for you to call (some don't) the modem speed is at 2400 baud or maybe 9600 baud. This will slow you down so much that it takes a much longer time to download one sizeable freeware/shareware. My average bill for AOL was \$32. This did not include the long distance charges for a long distance call to access a 14,400 baud modem. When the charges started adding up, I checked several local companies and found that they provided unlimited hours (or over 120 hours) through their service AND they provide 19,400 or 24,400 baud access through a local phone number. The one I signed with is in the South Kitsap Mall and is only \$25 per month for 120 hours of Internet time. Granted, not everyone will need this many hours on the Internet, but most who get started become addicted and can use the allotted time up quickly.

Many of us today are accessing the Internet to widen our search for our ancestors. Gaining the knowledge needed to make full use of the ônet' takes time. The net is such a vast intricate system of databases that each time we ôsurf' we find something new and often get lost when doing so. About once a month, I do a ôweb' search for genealogy and always find so many new sites that it is impossible to view them all. I keep a list of the sites I feel I will use, or access, over and over. The sites below are some of the best I have found.

Probably the most used genealogy software is Personal Ancestral File (PAF). Even though PAF is widely used, it seems that information about it and how to use it are scarce. And finding someone who knows it well is even harder. Here are two Internet sites that can help you learn more about PAF. The first one is put out by the Silicon Valley PAF User's Group who oversees most PAF user groups. Because those who know PAF the

best put it out, it is the best source for good correct information. The first is http://genealogy.emcee.com/PAF/better known as PAF Review. Once you access PAF Review, stay in for a while and check each little nook and cranny. You'll be surprised at what you find. The other is http://www.netins.net/showcase/pafways/. This site will also link you to many other non-PAF Internet sites.

If you are fairly good at surfing the net, you probably know how to download programs by now. If so, here's a site that has over 50 freeware (free software) that can be downloaded for using with PAF (a lot of the freeware is discussed in PAF Review): http://www.byu.edu/rell/jsblab/

genealog/programs/.

Below are some Internet sites where you can fan out to many other sites on the Internet. When you can move from one site to another on the Internet, it is called a ôlink'. Remember that all Internet addresses are case sensitive. PUTTING GENES IN GENEALOGY

[The following is an editorial from Heritage Quest, Issue 62, Mar/Apr 1996, page 2. It is reprinted here, by permission, because of its intriguing nature, not that we necessarily recommend it]

When considering the research possibilities in the 22nd century I start to get depressed. Most of us realize that some areas of research will be difficult, since such common resources as the U. S. census will be little less than worthless for any censuses from about 1950 on. Many large cities

don't have city directories anymore. The cities are just too large.

However, there is a bright side. Computerization of data and the private distribution of that data i; already opening vistas many of us had only dreamed of. Would any of you like to return to the day when we didn't have a computerized I.G.I.? The new Family Tree Maker World Family Tree CD ROM Disks promise to put millions of linked names literally at our fingertips.

At the FGS Conference in Seattle last fall, I was introduced to an idea that I would never have dreamed of. A company called Third Millennium Research, Inc. is now promoting a process called *Immortal Genes*. They are archiving DNA from individuals who wish to pass on genetic material to their descendants. Since your physical structure intellectual abilities and emotional traits are determined b t your unique collection of DNA, Third Millennium is betting that you will be interested in allowing you descendants to access this DNA for future research.

According to James Bicknell, Ph.D. with Third Millennium, there are several good reasons to preserve your DNA. First, your DNA can be used to establish relationships. The sequence of genomic DNA i hi used to show degree of relatedness among people. Mitochondrial DNA can be used to trace relatedness of females back many generations.

Second, Important genes can be traced through the family. Your descendants will be able to determine which ancestors gave them genes of importance. It seems to me that this may add a whole new dimension to family history. Not only will ones' accomplishments be catalogued, examined and remembered, but their very being may be investigated by future genealogists.

Third, Your DNA can be likened to a "source code". Major characteristics are programmed by DNA Future analysis may be able to determine what kind of person you were in great detail. The success of this program may lie in whether people will really want to be "examined" by later generations. Hmm.

Immortal Genes preserves the DNA. The process is painless and currently costs \$55 per person. The DNA is preserved in a glass capsule and encased in a "handsome" metal chamber engraved with your name. (One wouldn't want their DNA to become accidentally mixed up with someone else's!) ONE-NAME STUDIES

A One-Name Study is work done by an individual or group who concentrates research efforts on the acquisition, organization, and dissemination of all references to a single surname and its spelling variants in all localities and time-periods. The individual/group who conducts this research is called a "Surname Genealogist." A Surname Genealogist manages the One-Name Study for the surname. Some of the goals of a One-Name Study are to produce a regular newsletter and eventually a journal, to hold periodic meetings for the exchange of information on sources and research techniques of the chosen surname, and to answer all reply-paid inquiries relative to the chosen surname.

Surname genealogists spend years collecting massive amounts of data. Some members at AONS have over 300,000 records or individuals in their collections. A one-name society that Is organized properly may have a hundred or more individuals who are searching and contributing records on an on-going basis. All information collected is sent to a central clearing house; usually one individual who has the final responsibility of collection and

organization. Others researching the specific surname may contact this clearing house and request information on a specific individual, a group of individuals, a pedigree, and so on; if the clearing house has the information, it is provided. This could save researchers hours of work.

There are one-name societies throughout the world and associations for one-name societies in England and the U.S. If you are interested in contacting a one-name society but do not know where to start, contact AONS by mail at the address below. The Internet home page listed above contains a listing of AONS members, addresses, and surnames researched: It can link you right up to others with e-mail addresses or home pages.

Andrea MacDonald started "The Crossman Society" in 1995 in an effort to gather information on all variations of that surname. HOW DID SEABECK RECEIVE HER NAME?

[This section on Kitsap Co. history is reprinted from Kitsap County, A History, Book IV, Central Kitsap, page 43, by permission of the Kitsap County Historical Society.]

Innumerable accounts of the naming of Seabeck exist, some flied on fatty some fancy, some fiction.

The least plausible reason is that it was named after a place in Switzerland which looked identical to our Seabeck. However no Seabeck, Switzerland exists.

A commonly held belief is that it was named after Marshall Blinn's hometown, Seabeck, Maine (according to W. E. Priestly and Gordon Newell), or Sabock, Maine (according to recollections of Ella Olaine's mother-in-law, Eliza Rounds Olaine), but according to the State of Maine, no known place has ever existed in their State. There is a Sebec, Maine, but Blinn was not from there.

Research compiled by Dr. Robert W. Hansen of Seabeck states that "the Wilkes' exploring expedition of 1838-1841 named it Scabock". Through a probable error in recording, it was changed to Seabeck.

The following research was compiled by Dr. Hansen.

I had an opportunity to utilize the University of Washington, Pacific Northwest collection and was able to view Volume II of the Hydrography Atlas. In this atlas are located the drawings done during the expedition in the Hood Canal and the Puget Sound area. It was interesting to see Scabock Harbour marked and drawn on page 85 as per the descriptions I had originally read in the text of the Hydrography. The atlas was printed in 1858, in Philadelphia. Interesting place names are Scabock Harbour itself; Scabock Point which is now the point listed as Misery Point; Makak Landing which appears to be located approximately at the site of the Seabeck General Store and is most likely the site of the original mill of the Washington Mill Co. Other points include Sanum Point which is on a sandy hook on the eastern side of Misery Point and directly across from it, Wikat Point. Samum Point is located at latitude 47, 39 minutes, 30 seconds north and longitude 122, 48 minutes, 82 seconds west. The exact source is listed as the United States Exploring Expedition Atlas, Volume II. In going to the text of this material which I had photographed from microfilm copies, on page 314 of the text, Lt. Wilkes mentions the peninsula as "the Indian or Great Peninsula which divides the waters of Admiralty Inlet and Puget Sound on the east, from those of Hoods Canal on the west. The extent of this tract is 45 miles in length by 25 in breadth." This is evidently a description of Kitsap County.

Continuing on page 322 of the text under Hood Canal, "Hoods Canal branches off from Admiralty Inlet at Suquamish Head, where it is two miles wide. Its direction is southsoutheast, five miles; it then turns to the southsouthwest, six miles; then to Squaller's Point, southeast, six miles, turning again to the westsouthwest, three miles to Nukolowap Point, south point to Toandons Peninsula, which divides the north branch from the canal. Continuing on this course across the mouth of the north branch, for four miles, is Quatsap Point, passing the harbor and point of Scabock Harbour on the east then southwest, three miles to Triton Head . . . " Nukolowap Point is equivalent to present Oak Head.

On page 324 they continue with the description on Scabock itself: "The next harbor is that of Scabock. It lies on the eastern side of the canal, directly south of Nukolowap Point,

distant from it three miles. It is one of the most convenient anchorages in the canal. Its shape is triangular; its shore is bordered by a sand beach from which the hills rise: these are well covered with wood. Distance between two points of harbor (Samum and Wikat), is one mile; it is also a mile deep toward the southwest. Near its head is an extensive sandflat, dry in places at low water. The watering place can be approached by boats at halftide. The landing is on the southeast side, at Makak Landing. The best anchorage is near the center of the harbor, Sanum Point bearing northwest with a grey, sandy bottom.

Opposite Scabock Point is the entrance to the north branch of Hoods Canal which lies between the Toandos Peninsula and the Western shore . . . "

The next material is from Lt. Augustus Case's journal. I obtained microfilm copies of this from the library at the Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland. Of interest from an entire county point of view. In his diary, Lt. Case lists May 16,1841 as the day he received orders to survey Hoods Canal.

He used a launch, cutter, and two small boats called the Ariel and Pilot. They began their survey from the area around Fort Nisqually and, therefore, had to pass Vashon Island and Bainbridge Island. On the 19th of May, his diary states that they are on the north end of Vashon Island in the morning and up to Bainbridge by noon. It was raining. On Bainbridge Island they found a Suguamish log house with boards, and potato patches around it. The log house was 45 x 70 feet long. He was told by the Indians that this was a favorite area and many Indians would often collect in great numbers there. On his survey of the Hood Canal, he gave the harbors letter designations A, B. C, and D. Of interest he marks on June 2 that they were following Vancouver's chart right up to Dabob Bay. Vancouver had marked an island which Case found to be a two-mile long tongue of land with two good harbors formed, one called Dabob and the other called "Col-su-ea." Backtracking to his entry of May 26, he landed at Brown's Point. On May 28 he was at "Nako-lo-waf" creek and on that day they examined D harbor which was Scabock from the description. He notes that there is a creek at the head and it is protected except from the north. Skokomish Indians visit here and there is a low and swampy land near the head. From

this harbor he crossed to Tskutska Point then went on into Dabob.

For general background on the Wilkes expedition, they were given the orders to "survey and examine the territory of the United States on the Northwest Coast, Columbia River, and along to San Francisco." This order came from the Secretary of the Navy in 1836. The name of the Secretary of the Navy was Joel Poinsett, for whom our poinsettia is named. The main ships of the expedition included the Porpoise, which was a brig, and two sloops of war, the *Vicennes* and the *Peacock*, the *Pilot* and the *Ariel*, the *Relief*, a storeship, and two tenders which were the *Seagull* and the *Flying Fish*. The *Peacock* was lost later at the mouth of the Columbia on what is now known as the Peacock Bar.

Included in the expedition was the scientist Dana, who is the author of *Two Years Before The Mast.* Famous names for our area here include Agate, who was an artist; Dyes, who was a taxidermist; and Rich, who was a botanist. Of interest is the fact that Nathaniel Hawthorne applied as historian to the expedition but did not accompany it.

GENEALOGICAL SHOCKER


