USGen Web Project

Overview

The goal of the USGenWeb project is to create a global library for genealogy research. This library provides electronic versions of genealogical resources and volunteers to answer research questions via the Internet. The Archives maintain original source data (transcriptions of censuses, wills, etc.) and will be the foundation and material source for publishing of genealogy efforts.

The USGenWebProject will provide resources for each state (and each county or equivalent) in a format that makes national publishing projects possible.

Who were your ancestors, and what was their life like? The answer to this simple question is not easily found. The course of a genealogical project is slow and tedious. Public records are searched, manuscripts are read, and books are studied. Contact with other genealogists is sought. The information gleaned from these sources is organized, and theories are formed. More research is needed to prove or disprove the theory. As more information is collected, the answer to the question slowly begins to unravel. Finally, after countless sources have been assimilated, the information is finally ready for publication so others can benefit.

By far, the greatest amount of time spent on a genealogical project is in research. Originals of public records are scattered throughout the country and access to them is available to only those able to travel to them. Placing transcriptions or copies of regional records in various repositories makes research possible at more locations; however, the information is still not accessible to the entire population. The time spent searching for each individual record is usually greater than the amount of time spent utilizing the record.

The Internet can make access to records easy. The USGenWeb Project seeks to leverage this great new medium to the advantage of genealogy researchers in several ways:

1) A page for each county lists volunteers willing to do lookups in reference books. This "virtual library" network allows researchers to obtain information from books not available in their local areas.

- 2) A query page for each county helps find answers to specific questions and locate others working on the same families. A global index allows researchers to zero in on a specific query page.
- 3) The Archives house transcriptions of public records. This makes the finding of genealogical solutions and the location of important primary documents much easier.
- 4) Together, the USGenWeb sites provide a foundation for the publishing of family histories on the Web. As the library matures, more and more researchers can cite the on-line references in their own research, and actually link to the source documents which are on line.

Your family and mine might have no names in common, but we might find ourselves linked by the database of a third person. So, if all three databases are online, and if a mechanism exists to link those databases together, then we effectively have a single database. It doesn't matter where the data actually resides. What matters is that we have access to it and that it is organized in a manner that makes research easy.

The USGenWeb project had its roots in discussions that occurred on the GenWeb mailing list hosted by Gary Hoffman. In March and April of 1996, Jeff Murphy laid out a framework and began to solicit volunteers for the KYGenWeb project.

Each of us should ask ourselves this question and make some definite plans now.

Talk to the relative(s) who will take over the records should something happen to you. Or, if no one is available, consider leaving them to a genealogy society. It is easy to make a codicil to a will spelling out your desired disposition of the records. It is time now to protect your valuable records!



Notes from the Cibrary

During the past year we not only have acquired new books but also a large collection of periodicals, microfiche, and order catalogs. You will find the periodicals in their new location under the windows. They are filed in the same color code and order as the books. Because of space shortage, we have had to double file the periodicals so if you don't find what you are looking for, check the ones behind the front row.

A list of the new acquisitions, with their locators in parentheses, has been filed in the front of the library copy of the Index. If the locator begins with PER, you will find that item in the periodical shelves, HF indicates the Hanging Files, MF items are in the file notebooks on the shelves above the microfiche machines. All others are on the book shelves. Remember to check the color code!! A copy of that is in the Index and also on the librarian's desk.

Our AGLL order catalog, located on the microfiche shelf, is in microfiche also. You can order from that through us for the cost of \$3.50 for one film or \$2.50 each for 10 or more. To help with this, we are going to send in orders after the last Friday of each month. Thus, if there are 10 orders in all, we can borrow yours for the lesser amount.

Remember another offer we have for you -- you can send a list of as many queries as you want by way of us to AGLL's *The Genealogy Bulletin*. Ask for an order form for either of these from the librarian -- leave the order form with us and we will send

them in. The Genealogy Bulletin is on top of the file cabinets with the other recent periodicals -- the older ones are in the periodical files.

Our new periodical shelves are a work donation from Dave RUGH as is the blue stool for assistance in looking at floor level shelves. Dave will also enable us to have another shelf arrangement so that we can soon be equipped with a computer. The computer is a gift from Andrea MACDONALD.

Speaking of gifts, you can help us further enhance the library by donating to our Microfilm/printer fund. As you know our microfilm reader is only better than nothing. We have a beginning for this fund donated to us from the Salt Lake City Researchers. On the librarian's table you will see a tall round gold container — any change you would like to leave for the reader can go in that.

We are looking for volunteers to help the work staff of the library. We need (1) shelvers (2) a committee to hone the periodicals into a more concise collection - this would entail removing pertinent information pages to put into notebooks. If you would be willing to give us time we would not only appreciate it but you would be helping solve the problem of space. We work on Tuesdays now from 10:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. If you are willing to share some of your time with us, phone Marjorie at 871-0342 or leave a note for me at the library.

"The structure revolves around linking together databases which have people who were born, married, or died in KY. To facilitate the placement of these databases... we have started by creating a master page for all counties in Kentucky... This will give all KY researchers a single entry point to all counties in the state.

If you would like to have your data available on the web, and have names in KY, please look at the master page to see if a county has been created yet for your data. Contact the page owner and talk to them about linking to your data, and about locating space on the web where your data can be placed.

We are also looking for some software support, to help us implement a special LINK feature, which will help tie together individuals in different databases and provide an html pointer to the other database.

This is an opportunity to create a working model for the rest of the country, and other states may follow suit..."

In June, 1996, the USGenWeb began as an outgrowth of the KYGenWeb project. It, too, has had phenomenal growth. As we celebrate the 6 month birthday mark for this initiative, we have almost 1,345 counties being hosted by county coordinator volunteers all over the country. Here are some recent statistics:

From September 1, 1996 to October 1, 1996

- 1) 56,000 people have loaded the USGenWeb page.
- 2) There have been 350,000 redirects (people who have used the USGenWeb system to visit state pages).
- 3) Our page for introducing the USGenWeb Project to new volunteers received over 5,000 visits.
- 4) Individual pages for 50% of the states are more than 36% complete Individual pages for 20% of the states are more than 50% complete.
- 5) The TOP TEN States are: Kentucky 100% complete Washington DC 100% complete Indiana 99% complete Tennessee 91% complete Mississippi 87% complete West Virginia 80% complete Virginia 80% complete Virginia 80% complete New York 73% complete Maine 69% complete
- 6) For the past month, we have had an average of more than 2,500 queries per week posted on the various state pages. The most recent week numbered 2,775.

The USGenWeb project introduces several new ideas to genealogy research on the WEB:

- 1) Organization of data on a statewide county-by-county basis. Up to now, the data that have been placed on the web has focused on a particular family name or a specific locality.
- 2) Organization of data for research. Prior to the introduction of this project, very little data were available for actual research, and the available data were not organized effectively.
- 3) Nationwide coordination of volunteers in support of the project. The USGenWeb represents far and away the largest, most focused effort by volunteers to organize genealogical material. Prior to this time, several individuals had created some significant sites, but they were essentially one-person initiatives.

Fifty-one coordinators (every state and Washington, DC) have their own state page. They are seeking out volunteers for every county in their state. From the USGenWeb site (http://www.usgenweb.com), you can go directly to a state's homepage. Take New York state for example:

- 2) How to volunteer for the NYGenWeb project
- 3) How to subscribe to internet mailing lists for NY researchers -- 62 counties, about 1/2 of which are hosted (in various stages of readiness)

The status of a county may be any of the following:

- 1) No volunteer yet
- 2) A volunteer, but no homepage published yet
- 3) A volunteer that has their page on line.

Counties that are already online will have a direct link from the stare page. County pages in general have the following

- 1) Map of the county
- 2) History of the county
- 3) Names of the towns and cities in the county
- 4) Postal addresses or internet links to:
 - a) Historical or genealogical societies
 - b) County or municipal offices
- c) Other links of interest to people researching in that area
- 5) A page where you can post queries to request information from other researchers
- 6) A page where you can list the surnames you are researching from that county
- 7) A page where researchers (like you) can list the books they own.

Organization

Our organization can best be described as "webby." The individuals who populate our organization tend to have "webby" personalities. That is, there is a sense of interlinking of interests and a spirit of teamwork. The "rules and regulations" are few and open to change-the biggest rule is "If you want to play, play nice!" We use a lot of smileys: -) grins <g> and we like it that way.:-)<g>

Our structure is geographic: A user can enter WorldGenWeb, hotlink to USGenWeb, then to TNGenWeb, then to Lincoln County, TN. The county page may also offer hotlinks to towns since, in some states (New England especially), the town is the basic genealogical unit rather than the county.

Each web page is maintained by a coordinator. With over 3,000 US counties, it is futile to expect consistency-- and, in any case, not within the spirit of our organization. Yet, the user will find a great deal of similarity since sample pages and guidelines are available to make the coordinator's life easier. State coordinators support county coordinators and mailing lists are provided (by Dale Schneider and others) for all geographic levels (except counties, which are too numerous). For example, the mail list usgenweb@nebr.dsenter.com allows US state coordinators a place to discuss state-level concerns; and, magen-l@nebr.dsenter.com allows Massachusetts county coordinators a forum for discussion.

WorldGenWeb

Dale Schneider maintains this web page. This project consists of over 200 countries. Few countries have coordinators now since the page has only existed for a short time.

Genealogist's Index to the World Wide Web

This site is hosted in Nebraska and is designed to offer a nationwide index to the names and URLs that make up the USGenWeb project and other genealogy sites. It is being built and maintained by John Rigdon. The Index will provide the framework for local, statewide, and national linking of data that are being organized and published by the various county coordinators.

Call for Volunteers

In conclusion, the USGenWeb Project will require helping new people set up databases. It will require some funding. It will require that all data be accessible on line. It will require some organization, and it will require a lot of work by thousands of volunteers.

Cyndi Howells

Cyndi Howells is the webmaster and owner of "Cyndi's List of Genealogy Sites on the Internet" located at http://www.oz.net/~cyndihow/sites.htm. The "list" is currently receiving about 3,800 visitors a day. Approximately 1,000 new links are added every month, currently the total is over 15,500. Cyndi works on the list voluntarily, in her home, on her own time, between eight and twelve hours every day and receives more than 60 e-mails each day.

Cyndi has received many awards and recognitions for her site. Included are Best Genealogy Site on the World Wide Web for 1996, 1996 Journal of Online Genealogy Reader's Choice Award, HomePC's 500 Best Web Sites for 1996, Golden Web Award Honorable Mention Third Quarter 1996, and ranked #1 of the Family Chronicle's Top Ten Genealogy Websites Nominees.


Cyndi has been written about in several publications: On October 27, 1996 she was featured in "Search for: Genealogy," an article by Robi Zocher in *The Seattle Times*, Personal Technology section, page

C-1. On October 13, 1996, Cyndi's web site was described as a "five-star homepage" and featured in the weekly syndicated newspaper column by the nationally famous and popular genealogist & author, Myra Vanderpool Gormley. In the February 1997 issue of the on-line newsletter, *Treasure Maps Genealogy Newsletter* by Robert Ragan, Cyndi and her work were featured. And in the February 24, 1997 issue of *Newsweek* on page 33, Cyndi was described as "...the biggest boon to the heritage hunt ... no one has been more influential there ... housewife who became obsessed with genealogy after tracing her own family tree."





Contains over 5,200 probate cases for persons who died between 1861 and 1944.



How PSGS is Doing Its Part for Technology

PSGS has joined the wave of local genealogy societies taking charge of their county's web site.

In November 1996, Teri Frasier brought the US GenWeb Project to the attention of this society. After much discussion and research, PSGS authorized Teri to act on their behalf as 'webmaster' of the Kitsap County Web Page.

Teri provided a mock-up of the web site to the executive board for approval, which was granted, in December 1996. By the end of November 1996, PSGS had several Internet Training classes set up to train interested members. Those classes were subsequently taught by Teri in January of 1997. More classes will be provided in the near future.

At the March 25, 1997 meeting, Freddi Perry, of the Kitsap County Historical Society is scheduled as a speaker along with Cyndi Howells of Cyndi's List of Genealogy Sites on the Internet, and Ed Hallda of Sense Networking (aka: oz.net)

Future projects include additional internet training, publishing more indexes of Kitsap County records and adding those to the Kitsap County web site and/or USGenWeb Archives, accepting queries via the internet and replying in the same manner, and having a standard internet column in our newsletter to keep our members updated on the latest in internet technology.

PSGS is doing it's part and encouraging its members to do theirs. How you as a member can help: Access the internet and start learning what is out there; talk with others about the internet and the things you have found; volunteer to help develop indexes of Kitsap County records; and attend the next meeting on March 25 at 7:00 p.m.

Kitsap County's Web Site

In late 1996, PSGS authorized Teri Frazier to act on their behalf and become webmaster of the USGenWeb Projects' Kitsap County, Washington web site (http://www.rootsweb.com/~wakitsap/kitsap1.htm).

Teri has given freely of her time in developing the Kitsap County page which has been on the internet for about two months. She plans to continue overseeing the home page for us and to liaison with the WAGenWeb project. Teri has prior experience on the internet and in developing web sites, and first brought the USGenWeb project to the attention of our society.

PSGS plans to continue sponsoring the Kitsap County Page with Teri's guidance and help. It is expected that indexes we have published will be placed on the internet.

In the past, indexes were only in a printed format but with today's technology it is possible to place indexes on a computer and send them directly to the internet. By placing information on the internet we allow others to immediately peruse our index. If they find their ancestor, it is then easy enough to link to the page which contains addresses to send for the required documentation.

Indexes that are currently available to be placed on the internet are 1) Probates 1861-1944, 2) Cemetery 1871-1988, 3) Births 1891-1912, and 4) Deaths (1817-1988).

Within the next several months our 1997 edition of the Surname Index and the 1997 edition of the Library Catalog will be available for publication and possible placement on the internet.

PSGS' Publications Chairman will be organizing all future work on indexes and as they are completed, they will also be placed on the internet. Also, in order to ensure duplications of work are not being done by volunteers, other societies in the county will be contacted for listings of works they have completed or plan to work on. This is very important as one of our members recently spent a great deal of time working on a project which was found to have been completed previously by the Historical Society.

A local webmaster by the name of Missy Hayes has agreed to develop several indexes into htmls that may be linked to the home page that Teri oversees. Missy has developed several web pages (for our Government in Europe, for a one-name society, and others) and understands the inner workings of web pages. She is willing to donate her time in developing the htmls to our specifications and looks forward to working with us on the USGenWeb project.

Much work is to be done in order to bring Kitsap County's information to the internet. You can help! There is something for everyone who volunteers. Not only will there be typing, research will need to be done, maps found or drawn, other societies contacted, and much, much more!
