And they were all compiled Notebooks, loose-leaf binders and folders overflowing.


File cabinets, boxes, portfolios and more Cousins, uncle, aunts, mothers and fathers, Generation after generation from a vague past to a certainty,

Among us mere mortals she had no equal.



When you are driving on Highway Three between Bremerton and Shelton in the southern Puget Sound region of Washington, you will see the Grape-



view Loop Road. If you drive around the loop road, you may notice a sign for Rauschert Road. Rauschert Road is named for my grandfather, Johann Jacob Ludwig Rauschert, known as Lou, one of the first settlers in what is now Grapeview. Some of the homestead still belongs to his descendants. Let me tell you a little about this Washington pioneer.

My paternal grandfather was born on Jan. 12, 1866, in Dolton, Illinois to Johann Jakob Rauschert (1828-1882) and his wife Theresia [Janisch]

Rauschert (1831-1906). He was the seventh of ten children. His father was an Evangelical Lutheran minister who emigrated to the United States from Kadolzburg, Bavaria, in August 1847.

As a young man,
Lou farmed in Kansas and
South Dakota. At the age
of 22, he realized that the
price of land in those states
was more than he could
afford. So when he heard
about homesteading in
Puget Sound, he headed
west.

He traveled to Washington State by train in April 1888, and he homesteaded about 153 acres in Detroit, Washington (now called Grape-

view). Homestead certificate No. 639, dated Nov. 6, 1895, during the presidency of Grover Cleveland, is

recorded in the U.S. Bureau of Land Management. By 1910 he had cleared and was farming about 55 of those acres.

The first ten years he couldn't make a go of it on the farm itself. His son Bryan remembered him talking about the financial panics during the 1890's. Nobody in Tacoma would give even a bag of flour on credit. Lou would go out and earn a little money, logging for others, and return to work on clearing his farm. Most everything had to be done by hand.

Before he built his house, he batched a while with John Krabbenhoft, who settled in the Pickering District of Mason County, Washington. Krabbenhoft Road now turns off Highway Three going from Shelton to Bremerton, honoring another pioneer.

Grandfather Lou Rauschert built his house in 1895. In order to do so, he bought milled lumber from Tacoma, rafted it together, and rowed it to the homestead, rowing with the tide and anchoring when the tide was going the wrong way. This was about a 30-nautical mile round trip. The house had a living room, dining room, kitchen and upstairs two bedrooms upstairs and a bathroom. Water came from a spring on the hillside through a gravity line right into the kitchen. They had hot water from the wood stove in the kitchen because a water line went through the stove. In 1913 the bathroom got running

water for a bathtub and wash basin, and there was a toilet downstairs, and in 1914 Lou installed gaslights in three of the rooms, with the gas tank in the woodshed.

He married Sofia Albertina Ohls (1869-1919) in Olympia, Washington, on June 13, 1899. Grandmother Sofia immigrated from Finland and had been working in Olympia as a housekeeper. She visited her first cousin Andrew Johnson (Anders Johanssen) on Harstine Island, just across the inlet from Grandfather's homestead, and Cousin Andrew introduced Lou and Sofia. Love bloomed, and son

Bryan remembered his parents being very close.

Lou and Sofia had two sons. Theodore was

born on May 21, 1905, in Olympia, WA, and Bryan was born October 13, 1906, at a midwife's house in Tacoma.

My grandfather was primarily a fruit farmer. He raised Island Belle Grapes, Italian prunes, apples (Gravenstein, King, Baldwin, Early June), cherries, and a few pears. In 1905 he shipped 500 boxes of apples, seventeen baskets of cherries, four boxes of plums, sixty cases of eggs, twelve 25-pound crates of honey, four boxes of chickens, and one veal calf. The *Mason County Journal* on Dec. 8, 1905, reported, "Haskells's launch Monday brought up two tons of dried prunes from Rauschert's for the L.M. Co. The product of the dryer this year was about five tons, another ton being taken by the Simpson Logging Co., and the remainder being sold in Ta-

coma."

In 1914 he planted the Gravenstein apple orchard. The trees turned out not to be Gravesteins, so they had to cut branches and graft Gravenstein stock onto the trees. In 1915 Lou bought some geese, but apparently the geese didn't last long.

The Rauscherts usually had a milk cow and sold milk to neighbors. But Lou did not charge the folks who were too poor to pay. He told his son Bryan that the children needed milk to drink. All travel in the early days was by water. Freight boats came by. Lou and his boys rowed out or used a float to load and unload cargo.

The mail also came by water. The first ten years Lou rowed across Case Inlet to Vaughn for his mail, a seven and a half-mile round trip. Then in the late 1890's the Detroit Township was platted, and Detroit got a post office. From 1916-1926 Lou received mail from the Stadium post office on McLane's Cove. Finally, in the 1920's the whole area of Detroit became Grapeview, and all the residents used the Grapeview address. So his address went from Vaughn to Detroit to Stadium to Grapeview!

Lou never owned a car. In 1904 or 1905 he built a twenty-four-foot round-bottom boat from cedar strips and named it the *T.R.* He powered the boat with a single cylinder Regal gasoline engine, which cost about \$200.

Over the years, Lou sold off some of the homestead to get neighbors. He was always glad to see new folks move in. Lou participated in the growing community. He helped to organize Mason County School District Fifty-Four in 1911. The first school house was located on McLean's Cove, the first teacher being Mary E McGraw. Grandfather Lou was also a port district director and a crop reporter for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. He performed the first emergency medical services in the area, as he could sew up cuts. Folks who needed a wound stitched would go to Lou.

Esther [Carlson] Goetsche, who died in 2005 at age 96, remembered Sunday dinners with the Rauscherts when she was little. Her dad, Lee Carlson, rowed them over from Harstine Island, and Grandfather would take them back in his launch if the wind had come up and it was rough. Esther recalls playing hide and seek with the boys Ted and Bryan before she and her sister could even speak English, just Swedish. And she remembers thinking that the Rauscherts were rich because they had peanut butter.

Grandmother Sofia died Jan. 25, 1919, of cancer. Lou took her death very hard, and my dad Bryan recalled that Lou never completely got over her loss. Cousins from Chicago stayed with them a while, helping with cooking and looking after the boys. Lou never remarried. Son Ted stayed on the farm, and son Bryan went to high school in Olympia, graduating in 1923, and then went on to college.

Lou had a heart attack and died on April 3, 1929. All these years later, just one of the old buildings remains on the homestead, but there are quite a few fruit trees and some grapevines. His descendants share a deep love of the land, and we are proud of Lou Rauschert, one of Mason County, Washington's pioneers.

The 1920 Journal of Olive Mullenix

Olive Mullenix was born in 1878 in Woodson County, Kansas. She died in 1944 and is buried in the Bethel Cemetery in Port Orchard. She was listed as 10 years of age in the Washington 1889 Territorial Census, 32 in 1910, and 41 in 1920.

Although his eyesight fails, most likely it is Margaret (Maggie or Mag) on the left, Olive on the right, and Gertrude (Gert) seated holding the kittens, because Maggie was three years older and Gertrude three years younger than Olive.

Clarence also shares the journal Olive kept from 1 January 1920 through 21 October 1920, which follows in serial installments of the *Backtracker*. In Olive's journal she writes the census taker came on January 13th. At that time Olive was living with her brother Estel, age 29, and her widowed sister Maggie Timberman, age 44. Their mother had died in 1901 and their father in 1904. Her two brothers, Raymond (Ray) (father of Clarence), and Estel were also younger than Olive.

Olive's journal is remarkable most for her list of chores and daily working of the farm. While in the 1910 census Olive is listed as a seamstress, in 1920 her occupation is "none." But she is sewing and making rag rugs throughout the year, and in the fall before her journal ends, she is sewing more. We then learn the reason, as she travels to Seattle to marry "Barth" or "Mr. Barth", as she calls him. William F. Barth (1869-1968) had been widowed and left with two sons to raise. He came to Port Orchard from Anacortes and opened a creamery. According to Clarence, it was by Olive's selling cream from the Mullenix cows and because Barth had purchased land from her sister Gertrude (Mullenix) Beckwith, that he and Olive met. They had no children of their own.

Clarence believes Olive was schooled through the eighth grade, as he was, and by necessity returning to work on the farm. Olive mentions many neighbors and friends as well as family. Horses Bessie, Bill, Maude and Nellie are not to be confused with neighbors. Clarence and his twin brother Lawrence were not quite 3 years of age in 1920 – and Clarence recalls his Aunt Olive caring for him as his mother's health had been compromised from birthing twins in 1917. PSGS Cemetery Project

On September 12, Jeannie Menchenton, Larry Harden, Jim Morrison and myself met with Fred Just at his restaurant, The Camp Union Cookhouse. Fred was kind enough to share his knowledge on the history of Seabeck and surrounding areas with us during

a great lunch.

Fred has decorated the interior of his restaurant with old photos and memorabilia of the Seabeck area. The surroundings set the mood for the stories Fred shared with us about the early Seabeck area and its people on the Hood Canal. In the 1800's Seabeck was a prosperous logging community with several mills that exported lumber to California and other countries.

After several deaths in the community the mill company issued an order prepare a burial ground

and thus the Seabeck Cemetery was formed. It is unknown the exact number of people buried in this cemetery. There are more than 170 verified laid to rest here and an estimated 300 burials in all. The size of the cemetery is not clear with one survey in 1883 stating the size at about one-acre and a Trustees Deed dated 1950 stating the size at five acres. Today the cemetery is overgrown with salal brush but along the pathways one can see some large concrete bordered areas that contain markers.

Fred worked on cleaning out the cemetery and transcribing the stones that he found. He is giving copies of his records, including a plot map of the

Working with the above so near the Christmas season – and seeing the several family books assembled by Cindy, I have been remembering the year I was finalizing my Lyman/Cleveland book. That year THE BOOK, as I came to call and think of it, so swamped my thoughts and actions that when I tried to think of some of my past Christmases to share in my annual Christmas letter, I could not seem to get beyond the 1870's and 1800's of Great Grandfather William Cleveland Lyman and his wife, Emily Melissa Ferris. For one thing - I kept wondering how Christmas was for their children - the LYMAN-CLEVELAND siblings there in May, Nebraska, Kearney County, where the snow lay deep and the blizzards howled.... I could not help but wonder if they were in a sod house then - so different from the lovely home in Illinois. Is that why, and was it so somber that our grandparents (William C's children) never longed for Nebraska as they did for Illinois?

Was it Christmas time when Father WC went to town for the girls' sturdy winter shoes and returned with little dancing slippers much to their delight and their mother's consternation? Looking at the lengths of lace I have that were made by Emily Melissa, I wonder if she also made some lacy things for the girls: Mary, and Fannie, and Alice, and Lucia.

Was it near Christmas that bitterly cold snowy winter night in 1800 in Hanover, New Hampshire, when Samuel and Sally Gould Cleveland left the children alone one evening not knowing that one over-heated brick placed in a bed to ward off the cold would set that bed afire? Although there was no 911 for them and the nearest neighbor was a half mile away, the children were led barefooted from the house through the snow to the nearest neighbor by Polly, the oldest. She was 8, Abigail, 6, Caroline, 5, Lucia 2, and Lovel 6 months. Lucia was later to become William C's mother and his daughter Lucia's grandmother.

What was it like for the Lymans in High Ongar, Eng-

land, during the Christmas Season of 1629 – the year before Richard would take his wife and family across the ocean to Massachusetts arriving in October – two months before Christmas? Would they have celebrated the season in England with pomp and ceremony of the Anglican church and then with austerity of the Puritan church in the colony?

How were all those Christmases of our ancestors observed? I am sure that my cousins and I inherited their love of music and dancing and laughter and family gathering even though dancing and its music were not in vogue in the 1660's of Northampton, Massachusetts where Richard of High Ongar's sons had settled. Sometime between the Puritan times and the Revolution, people began again to sing for pleasure and to dance in private homes where in the winter the guests would arrive via high-sided sleighs amid laughing and talking. And so, brought before the court in about 1676 with several of her peers for "overdressing" was Hannah Lyman, age 16, who "wore silk in a flaunting manner," one who enjoyed Christmas singing and dancing? ... Oh, surely, she must have

I just wish I could uncover a little something written by one of my family ancestors about their Christmas days which leads me to this plea: Take time this year to write in detail your Christmas Day activities — note the weather, and your dress, and your presents, the people you are with and describe your tree — include all the mundane things you think are too common, too unimportant to be of interest. Then stow that record in a safe place to be preserved and forgotten long past your time. Bequeath that link as a real glimpse of you and the world you lived in for your tobe descendants. Do that!

When contacted by her son, Brian, about her death, I was informed that her 38 years of genealogical research needed to be cleared out of the house. I hauled it all to our library where some of us are trying to make sense of it. It is a daunting task but our Librarian, Marge Menees and I are determined that Cindy's life will not end up in a waste can.

While sifting through 20 spiral notebooks and seemingly endless file folders, we wonder how she found time between raising a family, working and gardening to accumulate this amount of material. For those of you starting out with your family history project, this could be a lesson in organizing for in spite of Cindy's advice about "getting organized", I'm sure there are pages and files and notebooks full of duplicate entries. We have yet to find a research log.

Cindy provided so much support to PSGS that there isn't enough space to enumerate it all. Past president, secretary, seminar organizer, money raiser and most important, convincing the Senior Group at the Givens Community Center that they had room to accommodate the scattered material that became our library. In her honor, this collection will henceforth be known as the "Cindy Shawley Spore Memorial Reference Library".

Lucille (Cindy) Shawley Spore was born on 14 Feb 1937 in Idaho. She eventually found her way to Bremerton, WA where she attended high school and married Al Fantz. She had three sons. One who died in infancy and one who died too young at 34. She married Gary Spore in 1979 and aquired some new family. He preceeded her in 2004.

We met through our mutual interest in genealogy. The year was 1996. I was a novice attending meetings of the Puget Sound Genealogical Society and trying to soak up the lore of family history. Cindy was one of the obvious old timers. At age 65, Jacob's seventeenth and last child was born, Sarah Timmerman (3) in 1835. The Van Etten's ancestor arrived in New York in 1600s. Sarah and Edward Ten Eyck were married in Kingston, New York in 1853. They had ten children and the ninth was Grace Mildred Ten Eyck (4), born in 1876 when Sarah was 41. Grace and Thomas Magee were married in Elizabeth, New Jersey in 1904. My father, Leroy Francis Magee (5) was born in 1905, when Grace was only 29. He eventually married Ruth Kellers in 1940. I (6) was born in 1944 when my father was 39. My Dutch line includes Timmerman, Van Etten, Saxe and Ten Eyck. Men from all of these lines served in the revolution and what a line to be descended from; what a thrill of discovery this has been for the last six years.

Susan's Select Web Sites

Who am I? I'm Susan Helen Selders O'Neal Evans, an Illinois native who was the fifth generation to live on that land in McLean County. I came late to genealogy after postponing it until I retired in 1998. By waiting, I lost three generations of family information - I had three great-grandparents in my childhood, and now I'm the "older generation." In July, I visited five generations of graves in my Broughton line and four in several other lines. By marriage, I'm a great-grandmother - guess that makes me an ancestor! My family names are all too common - Brown, Miller, Taylor, Ross, Schneider, English, Harris, Hart, Broughton, Busby, French, Eastman, and on and on. I've been fortunate to get a lot of information compiled by others, but that leaves me starting with their brick walls. I facilitate a group that uses computers in genealogical research and record keeping for Kitsap Computing Seniors.

Sometimes I may send you back to the basics, to sites you know well - but, it's those aha! moments that come when we see something we've failed to notice over and over that get us over the brick walls. I'll tell you if a site charges fees for access, and I'll try to avoid them unless you can access them through the library or there is a free trial.

Here are a few sites for you to explore:

What do names mean and where did they come from? Unless you have four generations of John Swift as I do, this may give you an insight into the values of your ancestors. Or, it may leave you wondering what they were thinking of. http://www.behindthename.com

Searching for Scottish ancestors? These web sites with access to records may be helpful, if you have family links to Dundee or the Tay region. Fees are asked for research and copies of documents, but some time spent looking at the web sites may lead to ideas for looking elsewhere first. The Dundee Genealogy Unit of Dundee City Registrars of Births, Deaths and Marriages can be found at www.dundeecity.gov.uk/roots/main.htm. Other web sites that may be of interest are a local voluntary organization, The Tay Valley Family History Society, www.tayvalleyfhs.org.uk and www.asgra.co.uk, The Association of Scottish Genealogist and Record Agents.
