
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# Hemstreets From New York West by Sue Helen Hein Plummer Part I

Hemstreets from New York West. (Continued from page 1) traced the family back to

Takel Dirk Van Heemstraaten born in Half Moon, Albany County, N. Y. (no date) but

married to Marita (?) (baptized 1660 presumed in N.Y.). Their son, Dirk Takelse Heemstraaten, was baptized in Half Moon also. On November 3, 1700, he married Claartie Iwtanboo Ouakebos (baptized in New Albany, Albany County N.Y.). Their oldest son was Takel Dirkez Heemstraaten baptized. May 4, 1701, Albany N.Y. married Oct. 10, 1734 to Maria Marinus (baptized June 19, 1709). Takel

Dirkez and Maria's third child was a son named Dirk Heemstraat (baptized Dec 14, 1740 in Schenectady, Schenectady County, N. Y.). In 1766, he married Eve Paford and died in Albany in 1790. As you can see by the language and name flip-flops, it is really interesting to try to sort out who is who. To add to the challenge, as with many nationalities, each son or daughter named their children after their parents and siblings.

Dirk and Eve Paford Heemstraat's oldest son was Johannes Dirk (who Anglicized his name to Hemstreet) baptized in Half Moon, Nov. 12, 1770, married Christina Reese (Rees) Sep. 18, 1794 and died Apr. 13, 1842 in Ohio, Herkimer County, N.Y. The family is starting to move west. As I studied the township maps of N.Y. and the dates of the moves, I tried to figure out why.

Johannes Dirk and Christina's son was Nicholas, born Feb 9, 1797 in Charleston, Montgomery County, N.Y., Married Hannah Reese Dec. 10, 1818 in Charleston (Her father was a Reese and mother was a Hemstreet, but I have not figured out the degree of relationship) born Jan. 7, 1799, Fonda, Montgomery County, N.Y., died March 3, 1858 buried in Quality Hill Cemetery, Wampsville, N.Y. The headstone reads: Mother, Father, Louise, Dr. Hemstreet, Anna, and Helen.

Nicholas was a blacksmith in Lenox, Oneida Valley, N.Y. I have a copy of his obituary, died May 25, 1893 from Lenox. He was known to be very strong and it is thought that Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's poem "The Village Smithy" was based on him. He learned his trade at 21 and worked on it for over sixty years. While learning his trade, he worked for the man who bought the rights for the first iron plows ever used in N.Y. state. When he died, he and his wife, Hannah, had eight living children out of eleven total. Their children were: Mrs. Mary Corp of Canastota, Marshall and Nelson living in Iowa, George H. of Oneida Valley, Calvin and John of Port Leydon, Dr. Hiram Hemstreet and Mrs. George E. Donahue of Canastota.

One day when I was out looking for something to read at a 'reasonable' price, I came upon a used

copy of three of Walter D. Edmonds' books: "Drums along the Mohawk", "Erie Water", and "Rome Haul". Knowing that "Drums along the Mohawk" had been made into a movie documenting the early colonization of the Mohawk River in N.Y., I wondered if it had any bearing on my history. When I finished "Drums", I started on "Erie Water" and noticed the similarity of town names and dates to some of the documented events of my Hemstreets' lives. "Erie Water" gives a wonderful picture of how the Erie Canal was constructed, while "Rome Haul" told more about life on and along the Canal. Since Nicholas was a blacksmith and some of his sons were lumbermen, and knowing lumber and nails were needed to build and secure the wooden sides for some locks and sides of the canal and all the horses, mules and oxen needed to be shod, of course, they would have been involved.

The Erie Canal was conceived in the 1810's and ground was broken for the first section July 4, 1817. That section was from Rome to Utica and opened October 22, 1819. The final section from Lake Erie to Black Rock was opened October 26, 1825. This opened a waterway from New York City to Lake Erie. There were many feeder canals; one of these was the Black River Canal from Utica to Sackett's Harbor on Lake Ontario. The Black River Canal had 66 locks with a total rise of 1,082 feet and then lower the canal back to sea level. It was forty-two feet wide at the water level of the canal and twenty-six feet wide at the bottom with a depth of four feet. A twelve-foot wide towpath ran alongside the canal that was three feet higher than the mean water level of the canal. It was nicknamed "Governor Clinton's Folly". It cost about \$7,000,000 to construct but soon tolls collected totaled \$1,000,000 a year.

- Feb. 18<sup>th</sup> I baked cookies and ironed worked on the loom some. Mag cut carpet rags. Estel finished his road work.
- Feb. 19<sup>th</sup> I warped the loom. Mag mopped the up stairs. Estel plowed.
- Feb. 20<sup>th</sup> Mag and Estel went to town. I baked bread and doughnuts. Went to Austins in the after noon to learn crocheting.
- Feb. 21<sup>st</sup> Mag and I went to Burley and took our rugs. Estel fixed his road by the root house.
- Sun. Feb. 22<sup>nd</sup> Estel took a stroll stayed all night at Ray's. Mag and I were home. I took Mags picture feeding the chickens. I went to bed in the after noon.
- Feb. 23<sup>rd</sup> I washed. Mag mopped the old house.

  Estel commenced to plow.
- Feb. 24<sup>th</sup> I ironed finished tying threads on the loom. Commenced to weave. Mag filled cylinders and patched.

- Feb. 26<sup>th</sup> Mag and I went to Pt. Orchard.

- Feb. 28<sup>th</sup> I baked pies in the forenoon. After noon straightened the old house moved empty fruit jars to root house. Put cot in old bedroom. Mag cut rags. I fixed my skirt and sewed rags. Vera and Irene came. Estel got thru plowing. Went to meet Gert and Beck in the evening.
- Sun. Feb. 29<sup>th</sup> the Beckwiths were here. Took pictures in the after noon. Estel took them part way home.
- Mch. 1<sup>st</sup> I washed and mopped. Started Mrs.

  Kemps rug. Mag cleaned barns and got dinner. Estel went to plow for Tom

  Haney. Mrs. Austin came up in the after noon and saw me weave. Mag cut carpet rags.
- Mch. 2<sup>nd</sup> I ironed. Mag was sick. Ernie Holman came past going to his traps. I finished Mrs. Kemp's rug. Mag made stockings in the afternoon. Estel still plowing.
- Mch 3<sup>rd</sup> Estel and I took Bill to Burley. But too late, left her there. Got rags from Mrs.

Horn (Ham?). Mag cleaned up the house. I finished my waist. Estel cleaned up limbs. Estel went back to Burley to get Bill. It rained.

- Mch 4<sup>th</sup> Mag and I went to Pt. Orchard. Estel fixed the logan berries.
- Mch 5<sup>th</sup> I churned. Mag mopped the old house. I sewed in the after noon. Mag and I picked out R.I. hens to raise chicken from. Estel plowed and harrowed for Tom Haney. Trusty treed a cat.
- Mch 6<sup>th</sup> I sewed and baked bread and a cake. Mag mopped. We all went to school meeting in the after noon. Mag went from there to Rays and stayed all night.
- Sun. Mch 7<sup>th</sup> Ray came home with Mag for dinner. We all went for a drive in the after noon. Took Maud.
- Mch 8<sup>th</sup> I washed in the fore noon. Estel went to plow for Hainey but came home as he was not at home. Mag made stockings. Estel and I plowed a strawberry patch.

- April 8th I went to Burley to get feed. Got me a pair of shoes. Sewed in the after noon. Mag fished in fore noon, mopped the upstairs in after noon. Estel worked in the bottom. Went to Beckwiths to stay all night.

April 13th – I took the dead canes out of the logan berries and pruned my rose bushes in the fore noon. After noon I took poultry wire off. Mag worked in the rhubarb till the rain drove us in. Then made a fire in the old house and sewed carpet rags.

Mag cut rags. Estel hauled manure.

Mag washed the blankets.

April 14<sup>th</sup> – I finished taking off my poultry wire. Mag finished working in the rhubarb.

April 15th – Estel and Mag went to Port Orchard took Bessie's trunk and she rode down. She went away. I cleaned the upstairs and baked bread and chunked up my stmp. Austin and his father came up in the evening to grind his plow cutter.

April 16<sup>th</sup> – I baked cookies in the fore noon. Helped Mag set out cabbage plants and helped Estel mark potatoes rows in the after noon.

April 17<sup>th</sup> – Mag mopped the kitchen. I baked a cake and started beans to bake. Estel commenced to plant potatoes.

Sun. April 18<sup>th</sup> – Mag and Estel drove to Beckwiths.

I was alone all day had a good rest.

April 19<sup>th</sup> – I washed in the fore noon. Mag mopped the kitchen. Sewed carpet rags in the after noon. Mag cut rags.

April 20<sup>th</sup> – I ironed and did my mending in the fore noon. Mag went to Ray's. I fixed my loom and did some weaving. Mrs. Austin came in the after noon. Mag staid all night at Ray's. Beck came in the evening to help Estel haul manure for a couple of days. Pansy laid out all night.

April 21<sup>st</sup> – Mag came home from Ray's. I baked bread. Beck and Estel are hauling manure. Will have to go and hunt the cows and see if I can find Pansy. Found her at Parkers.

April 22<sup>nd</sup> – Mag mopped the up stairs. I got dinner.

Took Estel and Beck's picture. Finished my rug that was in the loom. Mag hunted the cows. Beck went home. Estel took him part way.

April 23<sup>rd</sup> – Mag and Î went to Port Orchard went to Beckwiths for dinner. Got home late and churned after night.

April 24<sup>th</sup> – Estel went to Bremerton to settle with Grabbe. Mag and I went to Burley.

Mopped the kitchen before we went.

Bargained for a stove for Ray. Went to see Dean Lake about slashing. When we got home Lake came to see me about it. Mag went to Ray's to stay all night.

Sun. April 25<sup>th</sup> – Mag came home from Ray's. Ray came with her. Was here for dinner. He and Estel went to see Vic Smith about the stove. He bot it. Mag and I took a sleep. Mr. Barth came. Ray walked home.

Ap;ril 26<sup>th</sup> – I washed and mopped the old house.

Mag mopped the kitchen. Estel disced the potato patch. Nice and warm. Ludwig came to buy some beans.

April 27<sup>th</sup> – Mag went to Ray to help with the washing. I ironed. Went over to Ludwig's in the after noon to take his picture. Took Estel and Trusty. Estel marked potato rows. Pansy had a calf.

April 28<sup>th</sup> – I baked bread. Mag came home from Ray's She cleaned the upstairs and kitchen. Mag and Estel went to hunt the young cattle in the evening.

April 29<sup>th</sup> – Mag and I went to Pt. Orchard. The marshall got after us.

April 30<sup>th</sup> – I churned. Mag mopped the kitchen. I went to meet Beck and Gert. It rained. I got wet. In the after noon Gert and I went to Lakes. Irene came up after school.

Beck came to help Estel plant potatoes.

Mag cleaned the pantry.

May 1<sup>st</sup> – I baked bread. Mag mopped the kitchen.

Gert and Irene cleaned the Organ. Gert took a sleep in the after noon. I crocheted.

Beck and Estel finished planting potatoes.

Sun. May 2<sup>nd</sup> – Estel and Beck took a walk. Gert and Irene went to Barths to meet them.

Deane Lake and Logger Bill came to see about the slashing. Mr. Barth came in the after noon. Estel took Becks home as far as Ray's.

May 3<sup>rd</sup> – Mag washed. Estel and I went to measure off the slashing. Mag mopped the old house and kitchen. She and Estel took the calves to Otto's pasture.

May 4<sup>th</sup> – I ironed and patched. Mag worked in the garden. Then at four we went to take a walk. Chased the cows to Smiths and back again.

Friday, found a book on a friend's line that I'm working on. Unfortunately, it's out on loan so I can't look at it. On Monday, I'll be able to find out where it is and when it might be back. Probably not while we're here.

Saturday, I looked at a few more films without getting much. Did pick up some births & marriages in some of my wife's collateral lines in old Massachusetts.

Sunday, some of us went over to the Skybox Sports Bar & Grill and watched the Seahawks almost play a great game against the Bears. So close! Phyllis Wahlquist arrived today so at the moment, we have Continued on page 13)

(Continued from page 12) Salt Lake City Triumph. eight people here. Tomorrow, Jim & Sandie fly back home so we'll be down to six.

Monday is one of those short days, the library closes at 5:00 PM. I collected a couple of pedigrees from the Pedigree Resource Files since that's something I can't do when I get home. It may be good info or not, we'll just have to see what I can verify. Some of it looks promising. All of today's work is on my stepmother's side so it's more for my little brother than for me. Oh, and about that book that's out on loan... It's over at BYU being prepped and digitized and it should be online by sometime in March. Isn't that cool!

Tuesday I tackled one of my wife's dead ends in old New Hampshire. After spending some time deciphering the writing in the old town records, I had some birth & marriage records and a few questions. As I was talking with Sue Plummer about the ancestor's apparent disappearance from 1777-80, I realized that during that time frame, this thing called the Revolutionary War occurred. Sue promptly said, "Come with me" and we headed for the DAR books. To make a long story short, by Wednesday afternoon, I now know considerably more about this person and his family than I thought possible. I do believe that I'm now ready to go research my European ancestors down in the basement. Sue & Paulette flew home today (Wednesday), so we're now down to four people; my three moms and I.

Thursday, only three more days to wrap up what I wanted to accomplish on this trip. I finally made it down to B1 to do some German and French research. I spent a lot of the day looking through films that were dead ends. Towards the end of the day though, I did find a marriage record that I wanted and I also got a possible lead on another of my ancestors. We'll find out tomorrow.

On Friday, I chased down that lead on my Ropke family in Pomerania. I believe I now know who my Christlieb Ropke's father is; it is probably Christlieb Ropke. I say probably because the church records in the parish where he farmed do not exist anymore. The front desk persons that have been helping me with the translations also think that this particular family was what was known as "movers". The children would migrate eastward to where there was work, settle and raise a family. Then their children would migrate eastward once again. They told me it is almost impossible to trace one of these families unless excellent records are available. That is certainly not the case in Pomerania. To finish off the day, I stopped at the books on the main floor and copied about eighty pages of a book on the Massey/ de Mascy line. This research has been recently redone in a painstaking manner (also expensive). Apparently, there is some nobility in my distant past. It will fit in well with all my farmers, woodcutters, herdsmen, servants & general malcontents.

Saturday, I tried to go through some Old Latin Church records from France to see if I could locate any branches of my Mettling ancestral line. I try to check one or two outlying villages in the area where they lived each time we're in Salt Lake City. There is one film that I might have to go back through again once I've checked some other papers. Many familiar names (more of those collateral lines). Once I get back to the hotel and start packing, I realize that I've managed to accumulate a healthy stack of papers to take home with me. I am really quite pleased with what I did manage to find, although I am also disappointed in what I didn't find too.

Sunday, the four of us had a late (8:00 am) breakfast before checking out of the hotel and heading for the airport. It was an uneventful flight home and once I retrieved my luggage, I barely made the airporter run. All in all, I had a good trip to SLC this year. It snowed a couple of times while we were there, the temperature only made it into the thirties on three or four occasions and there a couple of nights that it got into negative numbers. Yes, it's good to be back in Puget Sound and the slightly warmer, seemingly never-ending rain. I never, ever thought I would say that!

Due to the fact that we are expanding with the acquisition of more books and more equipment, we are doing a little more rearranging. Our Pacific Northwest Room now includes research materials for that locale but it also has a section for Northwest Native Americans and for all Native Americans in this hemisphere. We have also expanded with a work area for the Cemetery Project and a special area for its maps and displays... this section is at the far end from the entrance and is located by the general maps and atlases...Sandie Morrison, who not only spends many hours here along with outside work, is the driving force for this as well as the inspiration for its being a major community contribution from PSGS. She has assistants who work diligently along side her. Another ongoing work section here is the obituary project under the direction of Jeanne Menchenton, who along with her helpers devotes many hours of work to this. Both these activities offer an opportunity for members to not only give time and help to PSGS but to enjoy themselves at the same time - not to mention the warm welcome they would receive from Sandie and/or Jeanne.

Last November I began to make another big move of books from one shelf to another in order to gain a little more space, but I could see that was a waste of time, as shelf space in the book room has become almost non-existent. As I continued to log in more books, the shelves in the new bookcase were filled – no room to move them to the regular shelves – no room for more logged-in books! So there we were with two options: (1) Dispense with the work tables in the Book Room and run shelving down the middle or (2) Expand into the little room off our "kitchen" nook.

(1) Just simply was not to be done since then there would be no area for work or for meetings.


# Annual PSGS Garage Sale Friday and Saturday July 20th and 21st
