On the Beach During World War II by IdaMae Swedberg

I lived literally "On the Beach" or nearly so and thus my wartime experiences were somewhat different from most.

Starting with December 7th, 1941, I was at boarding school in my junior year of high school. My school was Mt. Angel Academy in Mt Angel,

And hike our trails


Our forests are still green

And our streams tumble on



Oregon. It had classes from kindergarten through college. It was founded and run by Benedictine Sis-

ters and on the hill above the town was St. Benedict's Monastery. I note this as priests from Mt Casino, in Italy founded it and the destruction of Mt. Casino was like a blow to the very heart of the

town. December 8th was a celebration for the Feast Day of the Immaculate Conception but we were celebrating the evening before. Whenever there was

a Holy Day of importance, we were treated to a special dinner. Meals were usually eaten in silence but on these occasions, we were allowed music from a radio and a relaxed atmosphere. Suddenly the radio broke in with the announcement that Pearl Harbor had been bombed. Everyone was in shock. Several of the college girls were engaged to service personnel stationed at Pearl and several oth-

ers had brothers in service in general. There were a lot of tears shed.

Then when I came home for Easter, I went looking around town. We lived in Seaside, Oregon then. There was a Japanese family, the only one, who had a curio shop that had such wondrous things. It was all closed and I was told the army had taken them away. This really began to bring the war into focus for me. But from then until I came home after graduation, it was sort of in the background.

I came home on the 6th of June and on the 6th of July, I went to work for the Telephone Company. Because of the Secrecy of Communications, we were fingerprinted and backgrounds checked before we were allowed to start work. At this time, the Sea Bees were wooing Dad for his wide experience in transportation. He had been a bus driver from the age of seventeen and at the time of the war he was Truck Forman for Crown Zellerbach Logging after having driven log trucks for some time. The Sea Bees were offering him a commission of Lieutenant Commander but Crown needed him too and got him an exemption.

Our area was overloaded with military bases. We had Tongue Point Naval Station, the Naval Air Station near Warren. Also, Camp Clatsop which had been re-named to Camp Rilea. It was also large army installation. The Naval Commissioning Detail where ships being built in Portland were commissioned, The Coast Guard Buoy Station at Tongue Point, The Coast Guard Life Boat Station in Hammond, The Coast Guard Beach Patrols, the army at Fort Stevens where the big guns were and several army radar stations posted on high hills in the area. I was looking over the information I had sent and I see I had omitted one of the largest naval installations. There was a large navy airfield just out of Astoria near Warrenton where squadrons of TBF's and SNJ's were housed. As I said, we had an overabundance of military.

Because of all the military personal in the area, the turn over at the Phone Company was high. There were many marriages and the girls leaving to be with their new husbands.

One night, when I was coming home from work, I heard big guns. They seemed much nearer than usual. We were accustomed to hearing the big guns at the Fort firing practice rounds but these were really close and didn't sound right. The next day we found out a Japanese sub had been strafing the coast trying to get the big guns to fire but they wisely had kept silent. The first round from that sub landed less than a half mile from my house and they continued north until they came to the Columbia River. When the Japanese were shelling the coast, they were trying to get a fix on the Fort. That is why the big guns did not answer them.

Living with blackout conditions, beach patrols, meeting may people who left all too soon, was a whole new way of life but it wasn't all grim. Mother had provided me with an old-fashioned hatpin I had in my coat collar and I walked in the middle of those darkened streets. I was told to stay away from places where someone could reach out and grab me. There was the Hospitality House where we had dances every month with the 249th Coast Artillery Band playing for us. They were a band that was just as good as any big band of the time. The house was sort of like an USO but not part of that organization. It was a place that off duty military could come and relax and we girls "of good character" were hostesses. I got pretty good playing Ping-Pong then.

We girls were often invited to bases for picnics and dances too. One of our favorite places was the Radar Station on a mountaintop south of Seaside. They would send a truck for us and we had many a picnic and socials there. They were all gentlemen to us and several for year later kept in touch.

When the war was over, I was a supervisor in the telephone office. One of our girls had a husband who was a civilian in the Philippines and was taken on the Bataan Death March. She and her daughter were on the last plane out of there and she had no knowledge if her husband was alive. I was on duty when the FBI came in to find out about her as he had been liberated, but they needed to know about his home conditions. I was interviewed by them and was given the task of telling her that her husband was alive and in a hospital and would be home soon.

Then there was rationing. Mom managed pretty well because of her early training living on a farm. Gas rationing for us was not much of a problem. We no longer had a car and there was pretty good bus service if we needed to go out of town and the town was small enough that we could walk everywhere. Dad has access to the company truck and could use it if needed. Food rationing was different, as was fuel oil. We had an oil heater in the kitchen and a fireplace in the living room so we keeping warm was no problem.

We had a small garden and two banty hens that we set to work setting on Rhode Island Red eggs Our house was a half block from the beach and we dug clams, raked crabs, and once in awhile we went to Cannon Beach and pulled muscles off the rocks. One of Dad's drivers was single and so he gave Mom his ration stamps and he would have breakfast with us and Mom packed him his lunch. You didn't need stamps to eat out and he preferred to eat dinner at a restaurant. As a result, with the combined stamps, Mom had plenty of stamps for canning etc. Another

Never once in her entire lifetime did she ever put margarine on the table. Cooking yes but not on the table. Then there were deer and elk hunts and we sometime had wild meat.

Sadly, the Hospitality House would get the news that a regular had been killed after he had left us and we all mourned for him. Yes we lived with the war on a personal basis and we felt very close to it as we knew so many who fought the battle.

How I Got Started Doing
Genealogy For Real
What Are All These Pieces of Paper
And Boxes Full Of Trash
And How Come You Have Them?
By Marilyn Roberts

That was a question posed to me somewhat indelicately several years ago by my very patient husband who was in the midst of moving them from one house to another. This was after moving them to Florida and back and into a big storage garage at our present home. Because they were reaching critical mass and threatening to explode or become starter for the next bonfire, I decided I had better attempt to get them somewhat organized. This consisted of trying to condense everything into workable groups and at least get it all in one place so I could "work on my Family History". This was done with the resolve that heaven forbid I should start yet another project and not be able to finish it. Little did I know that you were never "done" with researching for your ancestors.

At that time I was still working fulltime and trying to keep up with busy grown children and their very active children. So with all the best intentions I would sift through the same piles and move things here and there, but never really accomplished a lot in research, but I really enjoyed rereading all my notes and info given to me by an aunt and my sister. (Does any of this sound familiar to any of you)?

My cousin decided I would be the logical point of contact for any and all information she had on my mother's LENT family and she so kindly gave me her notes, papers and pictures, most of which I already had, because she was just too busy and didn't really have time for it. In talking with her, we came to the awful realization that we were now the matriarchs of that part of the family. How depressing! My only aunt on my father's McNutt side passed away leaving me with mostly verbal information that I carefully had written down and stored away. After my sister died I inherited more and it just goes on and on and on.

Needless to say it was now or never, so I joined PSGS (again) several years ago. I participated in seminars, classes, read articles, watched films all sponsored by our own genealogy society. Even served as an officer for two years to gain the knowledge about "how to do it". I just somehow couldn't get started doing actual research.

On impulse one night I posted a query on the BRADLEY RootsWeb query site in which an

Now if I can only document and verify all the bits and pieces of information out of these darn boxes and get rid of some of it, my husband will be a much happier man and my children will thank me for not having to decide what to do with all this debris.

One of the best places in our library that is and will be further growing all the time is the Northwest Room. Here you will find materials about Native Americans, Maps and Atlases, Obits, Cemeteries, Alaska, Oregon, Idaho, Washington with specials about Kitsap County and local (PSGS) Family Group Sheets. This room is well worth your time to do a little browsing...

Although the book I want to quote from this time is not in our library, it is a book from among many written by William (Bill) Speidel who was a columnist for the Seattle Times a number of years ago. He holds the title of being the originator of the Seattle Underground Tours. It seems he received a letter from a reader asking him to tell about it. He wrote that he really needed to do some more research and so was going to go down into the depths and if she wanted she could accompany him...... Which she did. She met him at the named time with 50 other people..... Nonplussed, he asked them for a dollar each and thus began the historical tours that maybe some of you have taken – and if not, would find interesting.

cerpt hoping you will enjoy it also:

SOUTHWORTH-PORT ORCHARD.....

we suggest you continue north. This takes you al ong the coast route through Manchester and prepares you for the fact that "Port Orchard is Port Orchard."

There are views of The Olympics on the right and neat homes on your left. The ferry does some twist ing and turning through Sinclair Inlet along here to get to Bremerton. One time a big Navy craft was attempting to do the same thing and the nice homes on the left had some astonished people who woke up one Sunday morning to find a battleship in their front yard. (It floated off on the next tide.)

For the last 75 years or so, there's been a bit of a problem about the difference between "Port Orchard "and "Port Orchard." *The Guide to Washington* is the most historical record in existence, but it leads the parade in getting things all fouled up this time.

So with the aid of the local historical group and Miss Chloe Sutton, an 86 year old "walking encyclopedia" of information about things concerning Port Orchard, we thought we'd sort of neaten things up, pat History on the head and send it on its way.

For about 100 years after Captain Vancouver named Port Orchard Bay after a young Fellow on his ship — not for a bunch of fruit trees he found growing there the problem of Port Orchard was pretty simple. It was the whole body of water on the back side of Bainbridge Island.

Then in 1854, when Captain William Renton got tired of having his sawmill beaten to bits by the waves at Alki Point and moved the machinery to Port Orchard Bay, he neglected to add a specific location to his address. Letters were written in longhand in those days and that was an extra word you didn't have to put in. Besides everybody knew what he meant.

Port Orchard was Enetai.

Well, that was simple enough. Everybody knew that if you wanted to go to Port Orchard, you went to Enetai.

But then in 1871, Renton's mill burned down and shortly thereafter a twenty-year effort Was initiated here and in Congress to locate a Puget Sound Naval Yard at Port Orchard. But that Port Orchard wasn't Enetai at all. It was a place on Sinclair Inlet, and arm of Port Orchard Bay. And everybody, including the Congress – which kept not voting for The Navy Yard – knew where that Port Orchard was, too. It was on the *north* side of Sinclair Inlet.

Then in 1886, a fella by the name of Sidney Stevens platted a town on the south side of Sinclair Inlet. He had enough pride in his own first name to call his town "Sidney." And everybody knew where Sidney was.... And the little steamers of the Mosquito Fleet stopped at Sidney where they were promoting a dry dock

Meanwhile, some guys got going on a place we know of as Annapolis – and called It Port Orchard. So we had Port Orchard Passage, and Port Orchard and Port Orchard and Sidney all in a cozy little there at Sinclair Inlet.

Then during the Gay Nineties, things started to hum.

The Port Orchard people on the north side of the inlet got their town incorporated. And Some other people in the same location platted a town called Charleston right next door. The two towns got in a big bust over which one would be the post office address and Charleston won.

And the guys building Port Orchard at Annapolis had a beef, and half the town – two people – left in a huff to take up residence in Sidney, a few blocks up the inlet. With aswollen population like this, Sidney went after and got the county seat away from Port Madison. Breathing triumph in every pore, Sidney decided that it, not Port Orchard, should be Port Orchard.

But the State legislature said, "Look, we already got one town called Port Orchard," and turned down the plea.

The real Port Orchard on the north side of the Bay decided they'd better cinch things Down and change their postal address from Charleston to Port Orchard. But when they got there, the cupboard was bare. Sidney had sneaked in ahead of them with the endorsement of the State's entire Congressional delegation and got themselves named, Port Orchard as far as the post office was concerned.

So then the mail for Port Orchard went to Sidney.

Ten years later, W. L. Thompson, one of the publishers of the *Port Orchard Independent*, which was located in Sidney, got himself elected to the legislature. In 1903, without a by-your-leave from anybody, Thompson sneaked a bill through the legislature and got it signed by the Governor officially changing Sidney to Port Orchard.

And that's where Port Orchard is today.






Ernest and Nora Blanch (Franks) Bates. Married in Seattle in 1901. My grandparents.

Linda Wilson's family had a circuitous route from Russia, by way of Texas, Colorado,

and South Dakota to the Yakima Valley, Washington. John Heinrich Pister was a German from Merkel, Russia. He arrived in Galveston, Texas and then proceeded to Colorado in 1907. His family consisted of son, John George Pister Sr., John's wife, Magdalena and their sons: J. George Jr., John Henry, and Jacob. Magdalena died in childbirth in 1907 in Colorado and John George remarried Mary Katherine Rutz. Mary had three daughters, Mary, Molly, and Eva Elizabeth and two sons, Peter and Jacob. Together John George and Mary had a daughter Katie. Then eventually went to South Dakota and tried farming. Jacob Pister married his stepsister, Eva Rutz in South Dakota. In 1922 J. George Pister Sr., his son Jacob and daughter in law Eva moved to Wapato, Washington in the Yakima Valley. Eventually, Linda's father, Robert Daniel Pister was born in 1928 on the fruit orchard that the family had purchased. Robert and Alice Franck then had Linda, who went on to become Linda Wilson.

Sophia Peterson has just joined PSGS and reports that she was born in Seattle, Washington in 1928. Her family settled locally when Columbus St. Clair arrived in Silverdale from Wisconsin in 1886. His wife Sofia arrived from Switzerland in 1892. These grandparents of Sophia's deeded five acres in 1896 for the Silverdale Cemetery.

Lorrin Walsh has a family that arrived in New York from Ireland before 1810. Great-Great Grandfather William B. Walsh was born in New York City in 1810. He was a police officer and retired as a detective. He eventually was buried in Bayview Cemetery in Jersey City, New Jersey. His wife, Rebecca lived to be 90 years old. Great Grandfather Abraham Lincoln Walsh was born in New York City approximately 1859 and he was in the New York City census in 1870 and 1880. The mystery deepens as he is next seen in Colby, Washington in 1900, 1910, 1920, and 1930 census returns. This family had several police officers that apparently guarded stage doors and met Cuban dancers. Great grandmother was Emalita Bacigalupi. There was time in San Francisco for the family since Grandfather Francis Edward Walsh was born there in 1891

The Walsh family story has Lorrin's father being born on a fishing boat off the coast of Whidbey Island and the birth certificate shows the birth in Glendale, Whidbey Island where the boat landed. Eventually Lorrin Franklin Walsh arrived in Washington where Lorrin was born a few years ago.

I became interested in Lorrin's story since my great grandfather, Friederick Keller and his wife, Johanna Joergens Keller are buried in Bayview Cemetery in Jersey

City. This cemetery does overlook Manhattan, New York. This means Lorrin and I are connected by earth and maybe somewhere in Ireland our people knew each other.

A gentleman named John Allgna has donated the list of key personnel at the Bremerton navy shipyard in 1944. This includes Navy officers, enlisted and civilians.

The Quest for Charles Taylor by Cyril T. Taylor

While exploring my ancestry step-by-step, I discovered that my third-great-grandfather Richard Taylor (1785-1869) born at Pierston near Gillingham, Dorset was the son of John Taylor (1759-1813). This information pointed me toward the gateway to my personal ancestral past. John Taylor had been born at Mere, Wiltshire.

He was married to Ann Curtis at Mere, Wiltshire in April 25, 1784. In addition to Richard, they were the parents of Jane (1788 –1782), John (1799 1881), and Charles (1801-1882).

I obtained a copy of the will of the younger John Taylor signed and dated by him on the 29th day of November 1862. This will included this very intriguing clause: "I hereby devise and bequeath a cottage belonging to me in the Parish of Holton in the County of Somerset to my dear Wife Mary Taylor for the term of her natural life and at her decease to my Daughter Mary Ann Taylor wife of my Nephew Charles Taylor now in America."

The reference of the nephew Charles Taylor being in America fascinated me and I thought from time to time to attempt to trace his whereabouts in the United States.

I had previously located the Charles Taylor family in the 1841 census of Hentsridge, Somerset:

Taylor, Charles, age 40, farmer, born out of county.

Taylor, Ann. age 40, born out of county.

Taylor, William, 18, born out of county**

Taylor, Mary, 8, born Somerset.

Taylor, Samuel, 6, born Somerset.

Taylor, Susanna, 4, born Somerset.

Taylor, Hannah 2, born Somerset.

Taylor, Jemima, 1, born Somerset.

** John William Taylor did not accompany the Charles Taylor family to America. He was born in Fontmell Magma, Dorset April 33, 1822) and was residing in Minterne Magna, Dorset at the time of 1881 English Census.

I had also located the John Taylor family in both the 1841 and 1851 census returns. His daughter Mary Ann was listed as follows in the 1841 census: Mary Ann, age 20, born out of county but not in the 1851 census.

It came to mind that my first move would be to search the various United States census returns for Charles Taylor. It seemed most logical to search the 1880 census first. Without too much difficulty on my part I found the following census entries:

Brookfield, Waukesha, County, Wisconsin:

Jenina Hart (sic), Wife, age 39, Born England.
Jenina should read Jemima.

It is my assumption that those names marked with an "*" are a target of my search. To have achieved my goal on my initial search of the 1880 census seemed rather too easy.

Immigrants to America from 1892 onward were processed at Ellis Island in New York Harbor. From approximately 1830 to 1892 immigrants arriving at New York City were processed at Castle Garden. (http://www.castlegarden.org). To explore this web site was my next step. I used the tried and proven method of trial error with regard to this web site. Without too much difficulty I found this out about the Charles Taylor senior family:

Taylor, Charles, Unknown, 50, arrived 20 May 1850 from Great Britain.

The Charles Taylor family had arrived at New York City on 20 May 1850 from Great Britain on the ship *Helena*. The *Helena*, Master: Captain T. Hicks, of 342 tons was built in 1846 at Prince Edward Island and owned by Fitzgerald. Port of registry, Liverpool, Sailed (1850) for New York.

I assume that they commenced the journey westward from New York City to their ultimate objective, Waukesha County, Wisconsin immediately. This writer presumes that the first step was by steamboat up the Hudson River to Albany, New York. The second segment of the their trek west was via the Erie Canal to its terminus at Buffalo, New York. It very likely they booked passage on a sailing or steam ship for a voyage across lakes Erie, Huron and Michigan to their ultimate destination, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

What motivated the Charles Taylor family to immigrate to America? Had they come into possession of propaganda prepared by the shipping company? Whatever it was, they had been encouraged to take this significant risk to cross the Atlantic to America and take the arduous trek across a vast stretch of land and lakes that was America to the New Eden of Wisconsin.

A book titled The Emigrant's Hand Book and Guide

To Wisconsin Comprising Information Respecting Agricultural and Manufacturing by Samuel Freeman. Published by the Sentinel and Gazette Power Press – Milwaukee 1851. This book went into great detail concerning wages, climate, population, the City of Milwaukee and all types of information of interest to prospective immigrants to Wisconsin. The publishing date of 1851 probably prevented its direct influence on the Charles Taylor family and their immanent journey to America in 1850. No doubt there were other pamphlets of similar nature that may have persuaded their immigration decision.

I next proceeded to examine the following United Sates census returns:

Significant Find:

While exploring the Internet I found that there existed in Waukesha County, Wisconsin a large graveyard by the name of Prairie Home Cemetery. One additional document was received from the Prairie Home Cemetery as follows: Order for Grave on Lot. To the Superintendent: The undersigned desires to deposit Grave 5, Lot 1, Block 48, Section A the remains of Charles Newton Taylor (Relationship *Father*) Place and time of nativity: Town of Brookfield April 27, 1857. Place and time of Death Waukesha County Home Feb., 1938, Funeral on Feb. 12 at 2 o'clock P.M. Cause of death: Intestinal Obstruction. Married, Unmarried or Widowed: Widowed.

Last place of residence: Waukesha County Home. Dated this 9th day of February 1938.

Signed by undertaker and Mary E. Kremers—It assumed that the latter is the daughter of Charles Newton Taylor.

It is my assumption that all those buried in Block 48 are related to Charles N. Taylor by one means or another.

Another note excerpted from the Biographical sketches for the town of Brookfield: CHARLES HART, farmer, Sec. 14; P. O. Brookfield Center; was born Nov. 2, 1820, in Lincolnshire, England; he came to this country in 1843, and in 1844, settled in the town of Brookfield, Waukesha Co., Wis., where be married in 1850, Ann Taylor, also a native of England; seven children - Sarah A., their eldest daughter, is the wife of W. Bingham, a commission merchant of Omaha; John W., their oldest son, is in Rising City, Neb.; Mary R., Charles B., Martha M., Theresa and Lotta are at home with their parents. Mr. Hart has held various school offices; he erected the first saw-mill in the town of Brookfield; also erected and ran a flouring-mill several years; he owns 110 acres of land, his father, Charles Hart, came to Brookfield in 1844, and lived there several years.

JOHN DIXON, farmer, Sec. 15; P.O. Brookfield Center; was born in Lincolnshire, England, July 31, 1815, April 20, 1842, he married in Auburn, Lincolnshire, Elizabeth Lumb, a native of that place, born October 27, 1814. In 1844 they came to this country, settled in the town of Brookfield, Waukesha Co., Wis., where they have since resided; their children are John G. Rebecca A., William H., Sarah E., Joseph J.; the oldest of these children, John G., Married Matilda Gelden, and resides in Gratiot, Wis.; Rebecca A., the second oldest, is the wife of R. H. Barker, of this town (Brookfield); William H., the third oldest, married Jennie Barker; they also reside in this town; Sarah E.M., the fourth oldest, is the wife of Charles M. Taylor, of Pewaukee; Joseph J., the fifth oldest, married Annie R. Taylor, they reside in this town, Mr. Dixon owns 140 acres of land; he has been elected to various town offices; was a member of the Brookfield Town Board of Supervisors, several terms.

I have concluded that the Taylor family like immigrants to America of various nationalities over many years of residence in Waukesha County, Wisconsin, had become a microcosm of the typical American family. They had established themselves as successful agriculturists. They had intermarried with their neighbors and after several generations their interconnections had become intertwined. And like their fellow Americans they were restless to explore the lands beyond the horizons and seek out greener pastures. I believe this wanderlust is an American trait. My study of this American branch of Taylor family does not attempt to unravel these relationships. That is left to contemporary members of the family.

The Quest for Charles Taylor, From the Waukesha Freeman dated May 7, 1891.

Charles Taylor – Action Upon his Death Adopted May 5th by the Official Board of the M. E. Church of Waukesha, Wis.

Charles Taylor, born December 21, 1820, in Hants Co., England, died of apoplexy at Waukesha, May 2, 1891. At the age of nineteen he was converted and joined the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Somersetshire. He was married April 11, 1848, to Miss Mary Ann Taylor, and seven children have been born to them. He served several years on the board of trustees of the Stalbridge Wesleyan Church, founded by John Wesley, and where Wesley frequently preached after being persecuted and egged at Stalbridge for preaching so directly and earnestly practical

Christianity and the duty of present personal faith in Christ. In 1850 brother Taylor with his family emigrated to Brookfield, Wis., and in 1878 to Waukesha, where he, as in England, he successfully engaged in agriculture. Soon he not only became a naturalized citizen, conscientiously striving as he understood it to advance our American institutions, but also having united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, he devotedly strove to promote the cause of Christianity in all its departments, especially missionary, superannuate preachers', church extension and home benevolence. He was an active, judicious and efficient member of this official board, and a liberal contributor, not alone to the church benevolences, but also to the general needs of the community.

Therefore, resolved First that, while we spread on our minutes these facts, and reverently bow to the All wise and Beneficent Dispose of events we also express our sincere sorrow in this afflictive dispensation, though triumphant and joyful passage of our fellow laborer to the climes of immortal blessedness. Second, That we extend to his surviving wife, children and friends our earnest sympathy and sincere grief in their sudden bereavement, and commend them to our father in Heaven, whose mercy is everlasting, and who doeth all things in love. Third, That we direct our secretary to present a copy of this action to the family, and request its publication the papers of this vicinity, and in the North Western Christian Advocate.
