Annual Trip to SLC FamilySearch Library

Last Reminder for PSGS Genealogy 2025 Trip to Salt Lake City!

Gentle nudge - if you are still interested in joining us for the upcoming 2025 Salt Lake City FamilySearch Library Genealogy trip, March 9-15, the quickly approaching cutoff date for hotel reservations at the Plaza Hotel at Temple Square using the Group Reservation Code of "Puget Sound" is February 8, 2025.

Last year our trip to the FamilySearch Library was amazing. Both the Library staff and volunteers were so helpful and really went out of their way to assist our group with family research questions. Our trip immediately follows the annual RootsTech Conference and based on our experience last year the library was quiet with lots of open seating as well as available handouts from RootsTech. It was very easy to schedule a 20minute personal session, which most times exceeded 20 minutes, with one of the library researchers to learn tips and strategies for research methods and roadblocks. Be prepared for the researchers sitting with you at the computer as they assist you.... but you must do all the typing. They will not do it for you!

Construction at Temple Square is still in progress and the expected completion is now projected to be the end of 2026. Many buildings are still closed to the public but if you check at the Library Information Desk on the first floor of the library they can provide you with a list of tours, Tabernacle Choir or Organ Performances occurring during the week.

DC Metro Area Genealogical Research Libraries Possible Alternative to the Annual SLC FamilySearch Library Trip

In the Oct-Dec 2024 Backtracker I listed several genealogical libraries as possible alternatives to the annual trip to the FamilySearch Library in Salt Lake City. In this issue I am listing several libraries in the metro DC area for consideration.

Library of Congress

The world's largest library in Washington, DC, holds more than 50,000 genealogies, 100,000 local histories, 5 million maps and extensive collections of city directories and newspapers. Its' North American, British Isles and German collections are especially strong.

Washington DC Family History Center

The Washington DC Family History Center (FHC) is a branch of the Family History Department of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons) and is open for genealogical research by both church members and the public. FHCs provide local access to Church microfilmed family history records, family history computer resources, and internet genealogical websites.

The FHC offers *free access* to several fee-based databases: World Vital Records; Footnote.com, Heritage Quest, FamilyLink, Godfrey Memorial Library, Genline, FindMyPast.uk, FamilyHistoryLink, Alexander Street Press (Civil War), The Genealogist, Historic Map Works, 19th Century British Library Newspaper Digital Archive.

Our computers also have direct links to hundreds of genealogical websites.

National Archives in Washington, DC (Archives I)

Genealogical Research

The National Archives in Washington, DC, has extensive microfilm holdings of value for genealogy research, among them:

- Federal population censuses for all States, 1790-1930;
- indexes for the censuses, both published and on CD;
- military service records and indexes;
- pension and bounty-land warrant applications;

- indexes to passenger arrival records;
- indexes to selected naturalization records processed through Federal courts;
- passport applications

In addition, the Archives Library Information Center has many published materials that are of assistance to genealogists.

Historical Research

In addition to Genealogy, the National Archives Building in Washington, DC, houses textual and microfilm records relating to:

- American Indians
- The New Deal
- the District of Columbia
- the Federal Courts
- Congress
- pre-World War II military and naval-maritime matters

National Archives in College Park, MD (Archives II)

Genealogical Research

- On microfilm, we have post-Civil War Internal Revenue tax assessment lists, 1862-1874
- Cartographic Research Room has maps and aerial photographs
- The Archives Library Information Center in College Park has published materials, such as indexes and

directories from Federal agencies, the military, and Congress.

Historical Research

We hold permanent records created by Federal agencies that include:

- Textual records from civilian agencies
- Army unit records dating from WW1
- Navy unit records dating from WW2
- Still pictures
- Electronic records
- Cartographic and architectural holdings


National DAR Library

This library of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) in Washington, DC was founded as a collection of genealogical and historical publications used to verify application papers for society membership. It now houses those applications and supporting files plus biographies, genealogies, cemetery records, Bible records, church records, city directories, periodicals and manuscripts—making it an especially great resource for tracing your ancestry to the Revolutionary War.

Genealogy Series III: Learn more about your Genealogy By Janet O'Conor Camarata



My Journey to Ireland and Standing on the Auld Sod

I inherited a few pieces to the ancestry puzzle about the Craigmiles, my mother's maiden name. One of the pieces stated the Town and County they were from. That was great information. Another puzzle piece stated there were 6 Creagmile (that was the spelling they used in Ireland) brothers. Because it is not a common surname in Ireland, any information I came across with that name I copied down. But just because the surname wasn't common, the given names were very common and there were lots of duplicates: William, Alexander, Charles, John, Samuel and so on. In 2018 I tried to figure out family groups, but it was too overwhelming, so though I made some progress, I had to put it away for awhile. Then I picked it up again several years later and made another attempt. I realized I needed to come up with a numbering system to keep everyone straight if I was going to create family groups and separate them into generations and find connections. It was impossible to only focus on one branch at this point when the branches hadn't been defined other than there were 6 brothers. I did have those names though. Another lucky break! So each of the 6 brothers was given an alphabet number; A-F. My branch became "F Charles". Then I could have his children become F1, F2, F3, etc. I think there are many ways to number family groups and generations, but so far this seems to work for me.

Most of my time in 2024 was devoted to gathering more information and sorting it out. A trip to Ireland was scheduled for the fall of 2024, so the pressure was on to make as much progress as I could before we left. I am amazed at how much can be found on the internet these days. One of the treasures I found through PRONI's website was the 3 lives land lease the Creagmile were given in 1757. Though records are sparse for the mid 1700s-mid 1800s, which makes it hard to fill in all the gaps, I was making progress. One thing I found particularly helpful to me was to organize the information I was working with in different ways. It helped to sometimes organize it by location, by

date, by type of event, or by the same forename along with surname. I have lots of different documents I created with this in mind. To see (Cont'd on page 12)

the data organized differently helped me to see new connections. I paid for an hour's consultation with William Roulston, a research expert from the Ulster Historical Foundation to see if my arguments for linking my branch up to the John Creagmile on the land lease would hold up. He thought they would.

One of my goals when we were in Ireland was to find the townlands they were on and see what the land looked like now. So I began to inquire about finding a guide to show us around. Lots of dead ends on that one. I tried getting in touch with the local library but didn't hear back. Several months passed and I tried the library again. Bingo! She suggested I try the Fintona By Gone Days Facebook group. I made a post on that and boy..... was I excited! Several people answered immediately that they knew the Craigmiles. Ann McDermott said they were the only family who lived in Screggagh now (which is where the land lease was), and another person sent a picture of a Creagmile house in serious dilapidation.... but somewhat still standing! We began to back and forth and I suggested we share a meal in Fintona when we were planning on being there and would they mind showing us around.

As the time to leave for Ireland became close, we made plans to meet. This is the most amazing part..... I think they were as excited to meet us as we were to meet them. They lined up Wellies for us to wear and we were to come for lunch, they would take us out to the fields, and we were to share a supper. These people, the McDermotts, weren't Creagmiles, but Padraig Sr. who is in his 90s remembered some of them, and the McDermotts now own most of the land the Creagmile people did. The land is still being farmed and the view from atop the hill was spectacular. Standing on the sod was a deeply amazing feeling that is hard to describe. There are 3 Creagmile houses they showed us: one is gone but an outbuilding still exists where corn was ground. A second house looked in better shape, but was too overgrown to even get to it. And the third house was in the best shape you could say, even though the slate roof was half gone and the walls had their issues. The iron arm you hang a cooking pot on and swing it back into the fireplace was still there. Padraig Jr. said yes it was ok to take a rock, which I did, and Katie took a piece of slate from the roof that was lying on the ground.

We checked into our lodging for the night then went up to Padraig Jr. and Lucy's house for an amazing meal and amazing conversation that went on 'till midnight. We drank, laughed, sang, drank some

more, and talked some more. As we were leaving, it felt like we had made friends for the rest of our lives. So with snow falling, we said our goodbyes and rolled down the hill to Fintona for the night. We were filled with afterglow for several days...and it's still there. Oh and did I say, on this trip was my daughter Katie, her husband Tom, and my 11 year old granddaughter Ellie. And Katie felt a connection to the land and the people that I was hoping she would feel. What perfect icing to top the incredible cake so to speak.

So in conclusion I would say: be persistent! Don't give up. Take a break if you need to, but don't give up!

If you were unable to attend this meeting, please enjoy the following pictures and plan to be part of the festivities in 2025.


